#### MINISTER'S MESSAGE John 14:15-21 'I will not leave you as Orphans'

There are seasons in life when the transitions, changes and tragedies can leave us feeling as orphans. In such moments, we begin asking questions such as: what will I do now? Where do I go from here? What happens next? Who will nurture, guide, and strengthen me? Those are the questions orphans or people struggling with any kind of loss ask themselves and others. And those are the questions the disciples of Jesus were pondering about when he told them he was leaving.

Most of us have been asking questions about the continuous changes that we have to endure concerning Covid-19 restrictions. At every stage of

lockdown restrictions, we anticipate what the big news would be and how it will affect our lives and worship as a community of God's people. On Tuesday June 1st the First Minister of Scotland -Nicola Sturgeon - stated that much of the north and south of Scotland will move into Level 1 restrictions, in line with the timetabled easing of restrictions. This new development means that some of our churches will now be able to sing in church, even if that will unfortunately happen behind face masks. So, we are still wondering when we shall be able to sing freely in church without masks and then have our teas and coffees after the service for reasons of interacting a bit more! However, there are other significant questions that jeer at us in the modern world. Recently, I read an article, published in October 2017, by Future Learn. The title is, 4 Big Questions

Recently, I read an article, published in October 2017, by Future Learn. The title is, 4 Big Questions the world faces Today (and Courses to Help You understand them). The questions include: a) Are we better together? b) Have we made life harder for the next generation? c) How can we slow down man-made climate change? d) What is the reality of immigration?

Those questions capture the relationship between isolationism and working together; between our daily activities and their impact on climate change; and between foreigners in our communities and the indigenes themselves. Summarily, the questions are about the ways we treat each other and the consequences of our actions on others and on climate change. And what kind of help we need for a better world.

When Jesus said he was not going to leave his disciples as orphans, but would return to them, he made a significant request that was intended to help his disciples develop relationships that would guarantee the welfare of society: 'if you love me, keep my commands...' (John 14:15). Love for Jesus leads his followers to obey his commandments and teachings and most importantly the command to love. If we love someone, we don't have difficulty doing the things we know they want. In the context of the world's problems, the command to love one another must be about our attitudes to nature and being one another's keeper as we care, especially for those who are unlike us! This is perfectly illustrated in Jesus' Parable of the Sheep and the Goats: 'For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick, and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me...I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me' (Matthew 25:35-36, 40). #### **Update on Church Services**

Whilst we have for some time been able to conduct worship within our church building, sadly we have not been permitted to give thanks as proposed by the Psalmist by singing praises to our God.

How wholly unfamiliar and personally unsatisfying this experience has been! Whilst arguably we have had the opportunity to concentrate and reflect on the underlying meaning of the projected lyrics – Hannah's accomplished melodies on the organ have incited a more vociferous response, with muted murmurings gradually increasing in volume from the congregation over the past few weeks!

Thankfully, as lockdown eases and restrictions are gradually lifted, the Scottish Government has moved Fife to COVID protection level 1 where we can (w.e.f. 00:01hrs on Saturday 5th June 2021) once again sing in church, albeit 2m physically distanced and with our face coverings and other mitigating measures firmly in place.

The 6th of June also marks the end of our 6-week 'Concurrent Service Trial', during which the church-based and online services have partially merged in terms of content, effectively proving the live capture and real-time broadcasting via Zoom. The trial will be discussed and evaluated at the June meeting of the Kirk Session and a future strategy agreed and launched.

On behalf of the Session and the Digital Strategy Team, I would like to thank you for both your patience and understanding throughout the duration of the trial.
