

## MINISTER'S MESSAGE The Family of God



The 17th of May 2022 marked five years since I was inducted as parish minister for Newport-On-Tay, being the first black minister in Newport-On-Tay Church. My appointment to a predominantly Scottish indigenous church showed how barriers of race and culture are giving way to a deep sense of unity among brethren despite our differing backgrounds. Before me, there are many Africans and people of other backgrounds such as of Asia, serving in the Church of Scotland. This dynamic reflects the real essence of the church as a family, captured beautifully by apostle Paul concerning the Galatians: 'For you are all children of God through faith in

Christ Jesus. And all who have been united with Christ in baptism have put on Christ, like putting on new clothes. There is no longer Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male or female. For you are all one in Christ Jesus. And now that you belong to Christ, you are the true children of Abraham' (Gal. 3:26-29a).

This truth about family is evident in our church in the ways our children are integrated in the community with others and freely participate in different activities of the congregation. And in the ways leaders of the congregation cooperate to lead the church and to make everyone feel welcomed and appreciated. Our desire as a local church is to encourage diversity and the meeting of cultures and church traditions in creative ways that reflect our common brotherhood and sisterhood in Christ.

On Sunday the 17th of July 2022 we were allowed an opportunity to enjoy wider fellowship with more than 50 people, mostly Cameroonians from different countries and continents. They had gathered in Newport-on-Tay Church for the celebration of the life of my late father - Daniel Che Wachong and the baptism of our daughter, Anna-Danielle Amosons. That service will remain a historical moment in the life of Newport-On-Tay Church because Cameroonians joined indigenous people of the United Kingdom to celebrate the joy of being one in Christ. At the Manse afterwards, Newportonians were invited to fellowship with us, eating African food, dancing, and merrymaking. These are signs of a well-functioning family with its characteristic support, love, care for one another, providing security and a sense of belonging, and making each person within the family feel important, valued, respected, and esteemed.

In Newport-on-Tay Church, we wish to promote these values because in Christ we belong not only to God but to each other as brothers and sisters. And we belong to each other in such a way as to avoid the things which normally distinguish us, namely race, rank and sex. In Christ and in our church, we want people not to feel themselves to be homeless, neglected, or abandoned, without significance. That is why we are deciding to join ongoing initiatives to provide hot meals and a warm environment to those who may be needing them during winter and beyond. We wish to give people the opportunity to find their place in the unfolding purpose of God.

Concerning worship there is a place for adults at our 11am service each Sunday and a place for children and teenagers whose programmes take place in separate rooms while the main service is going on. If you are looking for a church in the neighbourhood, please come to us and you would find a place where the unattached become attached and find their place in eternity, related first and foremost to God and his sons and daughters, and where people find their place in society, related to each other as brothers and sisters in the same family.

We are the family of God, and we want you to become part of that family or to strengthen the family bond that already exists between you and others in the church family!

### Green Pastures and Still Waters

As Dan McPhail, the engineer, in the classic TV series 'The Vital Spark' (based on the 'Para Handy Tales' by Neil Munro) once sang:

*"Aye the Crinan Canal for me, it's neither too big nor too wee,  
Oh! It's lovely and calm when you're frying your ham or makin' a nice cup of tea.  
You can go for a stroll on its banks to loosen your muscle-bound shanks,  
You can darn your socks while you're still in its locks, The Crinan Canal for me!"*


After enduring 7-hour delays and rescheduled flights to and from Vancouver followed by the loss of our luggage (repatriated 6 days later), Linda remarked that she "needed a holiday to recover from this horrendous holiday experience!" So, we secured a last-minute cancellation for a cottage on the banks of the Crinan Canal in Argyllshire; what a wonderfully tranquil and peaceful experience it turned out to be.

Sitting on the edge of Mhoine Mor, the verdant 'Great Moss' with the Iron Age hillfort of Dunadd rising proudly above, every aspect of this delightful and timeless corner of Scotland just oozes peace and serenity. Vehicular access was primarily along single-track roads with passing places - where sheep have priority at all times! Traffic speeds are restricted to 20 mph, which drops to 10 mph when accessing properties along the canal towpath, and if you happen to encounter a red light on the swing bridge, then it could take 5-10 minutes for the canal traffic to pass and the bridge to swing back to allow you to continue on your way. But incredibly no one seemed to object, no irate motorists honking their horns, no aggressive driving between passing places, everyone seemed happy to embrace the timelessness of this area and the associated behaviours it surreptitiously engendered. Even the waterborne traffic is limited to 4 Knots with yachts and cruisers slipping imperceptibly between the still waters of the locks and basins along this 9-mile scenic shortcut for mariners.


In the hustle and bustle of twenty-first century living with all the pressures work and life can place on us - we all need opportunities to take time out. To realise that rest and stillness are essential qualities for a sustainable and fulfilling life, and not just a selfish pursuit. As Christians we are no different, we also need to take time out, guided by the Psalmist who wrote that God, our tender Shepherd "maketh me to lie down in green pasture and leadeth me beside the still waters" (Psalm 23:v2). Our canal-side retreat certainly offered us both this physical, mental and spiritual peace, a verdant pasture by the still waters and an opportunity to rest, listen and hear the still small voice of God so often eliminated by the chaotic noise of the busy world in which we reside. May you all find this space and peace in your lives.



## **Remember Ukraine Project**

### Update from Zolotarevo

They are still hosting refugees – but not as many as previously. The authorities are asking all schools to open in September and prepare a secure shelter (sandbagged) with food and water. They still require assistance for necessities.



## **Current Activities:**

### **~ Vigil:** Every Thursday evening at 7pm on the Church Green

The Vigils have continued over the summer months.

We plan to continue these for as long as the conflict continues. It is important that we bear witness to the ongoing suffering of the people of Ukraine and stand with them in their hour of need. The Vigil is one small way of doing this.

Please do join us if you are around at that time. We usually have a Bible reading, time of prayer and short reflection starting at 7pm lasting 5-10 minutes. Then everyone adds more ribbons to the ribbon flag - you may have noticed that it is filling in nicely.

### **~ Cards for Ukraine**

These have continued to sell well. So far we have raised £800 in donations (including both card sales and freewill donations). We still have plenty in stock.

All the money received from the sale of these cards and any other donations will be sent to Zolotarevo. We are very grateful to Philip for arranging this transfer via the Newport and Zolotarevo Twinning Association (NAZTA).

## **Music-on-Tay**

### **Lunchtime Summer Concerts: 'Wednesdays@One'**

The Foodbank collection will end at an all-age service on the 25th September. The children and young people will be taking leading roles in that service and some are already thinking what they want to do.


After the service on the 25th we are planning on having a Bake Sale to raise funds for Rimberto whom we sponsor through World Vision.
