MINISTER'S MESSAGE Love is the Greatest : 1 Corinthians 13

The hymn 'Hark my Soul it is the Lord' is one of my favourite ones. I have great appreciation for the very meaningful words. Florence and I used it for our wedding 16 years ago and each time stanza four is sung we tend to look at each other spontaneously. We have made the words our own:

Mine is an unchanging love, Higher than the heights above; Deeper than the depths beneath, Free and faithful, strong as death.

It is not difficult to notice that those words speak of the depth, faithfulness and unchangeability of real and true love. 1 Corinthians 13 has been used for weddings, but it is not really about love amongst couples but more about the meaning and expression of love in Christian communities that are often diverse in terms of demography and outlook. Most of the members in the Corinthian church to whom the letter was written were from the lower classes (1 Corinthians 1:26), while a few sat on the opposite side in rank and resources. For example, Erastus, was the city treasurer of Corinth and Gaius had enough resources to support Paul and the whole church (1 Corinthians 1:14; cf. Romans 16:23). Unfortunately, this diversity among the Corinthian brethren led to discord and rivalry. They took sides with some saying they are of one teacher or another.

In 1 Corinthians 13, Paul aims to teach that unity and difference can be acknowledged, respected, and celebrated only when love is in the centre of what we do and who we are as a Christian community. The text necessitates our involvement, to make the kingdom of God possible and to activate and nurture it in our immediate communities of faith through love for one another. It means showing God's love to others through acts of kindness in thoughtful and selfless ways because being thoughtful and kind shows other people that you value their needs above your own. Selfless love comes from God. It is the kind of love N. T. Wright referrers to when he writes that 'love is the deepest mode of knowing because it is love that, while completely engaging with reality other than itself, affirms and celebrates that other-than-self reality. This is the mode of knowing that is necessary if we are to live in the new public world...the world in which Jesus is Lord and Caesar isn't'. Is this not the kind of love we need?

Dear friends, we are facing innumerable problems in our time. Many people are struggling to cope with the rising standards of living, caused partly by the war in Ukraine. Mental health cases have soared because some people find it hard to cope with the economic crisis and sense of dislocation. Our political system is more of a charade! It has failed to deliver on its promises and continued to frustrate good and hardworking people who live and serve the kingdom selflessness. In this darkest of moments, deep frustration and hardship, our pursuit of love can bring the light of Christ to those in darkness — to the poor, to the captive, to refugees, to the blind, and to the oppressed.

As part of our church initiative to salvage some of the looming problems, the Newport-On-Tay Church is providing hot meals and warm clothing to any who would benefit from this largesse. We are asking people of goodwill to make generous donations to our church at this time to help us fulfil this special duty of grace to the community. As a community of Christ, we are called to bring the good news of love to other people. When we are truly a community in Christ, a community that knows its unity and celebrates its diversity. A community that knows the reality of division, and yet has in view the cross that binds us together, we will be able to join Jesus and walk along him in his ministry to those who so desperately need to hear his love for them.

Please join us as we walk with people of our community during these dark and cold Winter months!



I'm Strictly a Celebrity, Get Me Dancing Out of Here!

The nights are fair drawing in, and with the dark evenings and autumnal weather come those other foretastes of the waning year: the appearance on the TV schedules of the elimination shows Strictly Come Dancing and I'm a Celebrity. I dare say there are many who enthusiastically watch both, but there will be many who prefer one over the other. Each show has its own characteristics. I'm a Celebrity relies on trials of adversity and interactions between the contestants, whereas Strictly focusses on the week-by -week development of the dancers' skills and the critical assessment of the judges. But both shows share the one common element: they discard the contestants one by one until the winner remains alone and victorious.

Looking at the life of our congregation and its regular call for volunteers, I sometimes wonder if our folk look on the work of the church as a task on I'm a Celebrity: not exactly pleasant, but necessary for survival. Others may find a parallel between the work of the church and Strictly: I'll try my best, but the time will come when my best isn't good enough and someone more talented will take my place. But I do not think that either of these attitudes is a Christian response to a call to service.

The story of Zacchaeus speaks volumes to me. You can read it yourselves in Luke chapter 19. Jesus makes the focus of his day a meal with a tax collector, a collaborator in the Roman Occupation of the Holy Land. You can guess that Jesus didn't come to him with a list of jobs needing done at the local Synagogue, or even with a request for money to fix the roof. No, Jesus is only interested in Zacchaeus himself and healing the broken relationship between him and God. The generous response of Zacchaeus comes from the restoration of that relationship, and not the other way around. He did not, and could not buy the favour of God, but in welcoming Jesus and recognising his new being as a child of God, he responded with an overflowing gratitude, a change of attitudes, and a transformed life.
