

MINISTER'S MESSAGE



Accept many greetings from Cameroon where I am spending time with family and friends and enjoying the sunny and warm days of my native land. The noises that fill the air with sounds and symbols of the approaching festive season remind us that another year is coming to an end and that Christmas is around the corner. Christmas is a time of expectation of a great promise to be fulfilled in the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. And we are called to wait patiently for that promise to be fulfilled.

Talking about waiting, I think I know what that means!

Florence and I waited almost 8 months before receiving our Indefinite Leave to Remain in the United Kingdom. We have them now, and this means that we can live in the UK for as long as we wish. But this did not come easily: the cost was

too high, and the waiting was too long, and our children have not yet received theirs. There were times when we thought that the UK government was very unfair to us because they kept asking one thing after the other and would not respond promptly with a decision.

I had also wanted to travel earlier to help process documents for my mother to visit the UK. But no matter what we thought and how we felt about the delay in getting a decision from the Home Office, we needed to wait because you do not force the Home Office of the UK to make a decision and you do not force God to act when his time is not right! Thank God the wait is over and we now have things sorted for the good.

No one really wants to wait!

But we wait in traffic, in grocery shops, for those ahead of us, for the doctor, for a spouse, for a baby, and for retirement. And we must wait for the return of Jesus Christ to judge and to save us from all unrighteousness. Waiting is not only about what we do while waiting to get what we want. Waiting is the process of becoming what God wants us to be and to achieve what he has promised to do. Biblical waiting is not a passive waiting around for something to happen that will allow us to escape our troubles. It is waiting trustfully that God will do what he says he will do. What I have learned from my most recent waiting experience is that I am not in charge and that I am not God. 'I am the patient. I am in the waiting room. In the real issues of life, and in times of great expectation, I must learn to wait on God. I must trust his wisdom and his timing. And that is why I can wait with confidence because I am waiting for someone who is trustworthy.

As we look forward to celebrating the birth of Christ at Christmas and as another year comes to an end, many of us are still waiting on something to happen, or for some promise to be fulfilled in our lives or the lives of those we know and love. While we wait, let us trust that God holds all things in his hands and that he will deliver any promise that he has made to fill our greatest need. An anonymous writer puts this well, especially in the context of waiting on the promise of a Son, the Son of God at Christmas, to fill our need:

> If our greatest need had been information, God would have sent us an educator; If our greatest need had been technology, God would have sent us a scientist; If our greatest need had been money, God would have sent us an economist; If our greatest need had been pleasure, God would have sent us an entertainer; But our greatest need was forgiveness, so God sent us a Saviour.



May God take away every form of anxiety from us and help us to wait for his promises with patience.

I wish you all a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year when they come.

We are all now looking forward with anticipation to gaining a deeper insight into Advent and the Christmas Season with a variety of activities and challenges.



Christian Aid Christmas Appeal

I am aware that we have all faced several years of problems and worry and that the situation seems to lurch from one crisis to the next with no apparent end in sight. Many people have contributed - and continue to contribute - to UK charities and Foodbanks to help support our fellow citizens in this difficult and depressing time.

However we are not alone in our anxieties and concerns.

East Africa is in crisis due to the climate crisis which is having a devastating effect on the whole region with its unpredictable weather patterns.

This Christmas, Christian Aid is focussing on Malawi and its desperate need for help. There, people are facing a combination of floods and droughts, so that crops either shrivel and die due to lack of water or are drowned by the extreme floods. As most families are dependent on small scale farming for a livelihood they are very vulnerable. People are struggling to obtain even their staple food of maize porridge.

Christian Aid is asking for help to train families to grow food in ways which are more resilient to the climate changes and to provide more sustainable technologies, such as solar-powered water pumps. Please would you consider giving a gift, however small, to help our distant neighbours whom we will probably never meet but whose needs are as great, if not greater, than ours?

Throughout Advent and over Christmas there will be red Christian Aid gift envelopes in the pews. These can be returned to me directly or via the offering plate. If you prefer to send a gift directly to Christian Aid then go to www.caid.org.uk.

I have not made this appeal lightly as I am only too aware of the many calls on your personal resources but I hope you will feel able to respond in some way.

manna—serving up soup, sandwiches and success!

You may have seen the article in the Courier recently about manna's success. If not here is a copy of the original article. Even if you have already seen it is definitely worth another read!

How does a small village coffee and fairtrade gift shop measure success? For many businesses it may be about the profits and the bank balance but for manna it's all about the community.

manna is one of several coffee shops in Newport-on-Tay which has survived the Covid crisis and continues to thrive serving the community by offering a place for people to come, talk, meet with friends whilst having a tea or coffee and some home-baking. It also provides a public toilet on behalf of Fife Council and is a recommended and popular refreshment stop for those walking and cycling the Fife Coastal Path. manna's ethos is to provide a place for people to meet and so retains an affordable menu making it accessible to as many as possible. This was a primary aim for the Church of Scotland in Newport, along with funding a full time Christian Youth Worker and providing an outlet for Fair Trade goods. So they took the opportunity in 2006 to refit one of the empty shops opposite and turn it into a café. The idea grew from the 'church



without walls' initiative which sought to take the church out into community settings.

Today it is staffed by salaried manager Diane (pictured above) and her assistant Morag, supported by a team of volunteers, who stock the gifts, help bake, make soup, take orders, wait and wash dishes. Diane is very vocal about the wonderful volunteers who help run the coffee shop and said, 'Many of our volunteers are actually originally customers who just love coming here'. When asked, the regulars list many reasons for continually coming back: good food, to see people, the company, to avoid being home alone, so welcoming, you always get a laugh, to get local info/recommendations and we've known many of the staff for so long. manna always provides a warm welcome and a place to chat.

While success can't be measured in 'chat' it can be measured in skills and life experience. Coming out of Lockdown, manna struggled to rebuild its volunteer base, many helpers being more elderly or vulnerable. News of a scheme called NOLB (No One Left Behind) was part of the answer; a Scottish Government employment programme aimed at helping those members of society who face challenging barriers to finding and maintaining employment. The aim, to help individuals upskill and reach their potential.

manna applied for this scheme and two new recruits started last April, both in their twenties and keen to gain more work experience and life skills. They fulfilled all the requirements of the scheme, working 16-36 hours/week for a potential period of six months, working in all aspects of the business. Salaries were paid by Fife Council, the scheme being overseen by Stuart Don (Fife Job Contract Scheme).

Move on six months and the success of the scheme and manna's partnership in this has come to fruition. One recruit gained employment at the Eden coffee shop in Guardbridge and another, Murdo, has applied and been accepted for the Community Education course at the University of Dundee. When asked about his favourite aspects of the job, Murdo said: 'It's a great opportunity to meet so many different people', something he will continue to do through his Community Education degree. His greatest love is the coffee machine however, and he fully intends to practise this newly found skill to help support his studies.

So what is the measure of success at manna? Admittedly, the profits which help to pay the salary of the church Youth Worker are a bonus, but the friendly ambience, sense of spirituality and care nurtured within this special space are a key measure for the 'church without walls'. As Diane says, 'it's wonderful to see the people who work here develop and gain in confidence as part of our team'. Whether it's the successful partnership of training new recruits on the NOLB scheme, the gaining of skills and confidence for many volunteers or the well-being of the many visitors who eat, drink or enjoy sitting in the café, the feeling is that manna does indeed serve up soup, sandwiches and a big plate of success!
