




Life, in its unpredictable nature, often presents us with moments of 'heat'-sudden crises that threaten to upend our world. An unforeseen accident, a daunting diagnosis, or the unexpected departure of a loved one can plunge us into turmoil. Alongside these sudden tempests, we may face 'droughts' - prolonged periods of yearning, like those waiting for the right partner to come their way for marriage, or those that are longing for their existing relationships to be more celestial. You may be a parent waiting for the return of a child no matter the age, who has chosen a path different from the one you prayed he or she would take. The loss of a job, strained finances, or the absence of a comforting presence can stretch our endurance.

Jeremiah 17:7-8 paints a vivid picture of how to navigate these challenges. The prophet speaks of a tree, deeply rooted by a riverbank, unaffected by the external conditions of heat and droughts. Its resilience does not stem from the absence of challenges but from its rootedness. Drawing from the ever-flowing river, it remains verdant and fruitful.

Our lives can be influenced by where we anchor our trust. Some might find solace in careers, fleeting beauty, or in relationships with loved ones. As comforting as these may be, they remain susceptible to change and loss. The true test of resilience is in where we root our hope, trust, and confidence.

In these uncertain times of change and transition in the Church of Scotland, and, particularly in our church in Newport-on-Tay, where we find ourselves in the midst of a cluster of churches seeking a sustainable mission together for the future, the theme of 'waiting on the Lord' resonates profoundly with our collective journey. We want to ask the question that is often asked: how much time do we have to wait to receive an answer to the many questions we are asking? And what can we do as we wait? When our individual and collective burdens seem more than we can bear and when unpredictability means we cannot anticipate the future with any degree of confidence and hope! Then we need to anchor our faith in something bigger than ourselves and our circumstances. We need to lean on God. However, we also need to understand that, while God can answer our questions and even perform miracles instantaneously, the times and seasons of our mortal journey are in his hand alone. He administers that calendar individually to each of us, when we put our trust in him.

Faith means trusting God in good times and in bad, even when it includes suffering until we see His arm revealed on our behalf. In our modern world where many seek to avoid suffering, this can be challenging, but this belief won't lead us to the fulness of Christ's stature. Life cannot be both faith-filled and stress-free. Christianity offers comfort, but it is not always comfortable. The path to holiness and happiness is long. It requires time, tenacity and trust.

The wisdom in Jeremiah's words is in pointing us to the unchanging, the eternal - our relationship with God through Jesus Christ. It is the river by our side, a source of nourishment that ensures we remain unaffected by the heatwaves and droughts of life. I suspect that some of you reading my message may not be members of a church and wanting to join one! At Newport-on-Tay Church, we draw strength from God's word to navigate contemporary challenges. We are a leading church in the area with a flourishing Youth Ministry and a dedicated Youth Worker. Even if you cannot attend, let your children join and discover the strength that comes with putting ones trust in the Lord. As Isaiah reminds us, `...those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles, they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not faint (Isaiah 40:31).

Sunday Club Update

Teaching this year

We kicked our new year off with a "Welcome" focus on 20th August. Since then we have started a series of sessions looking at key characters from the Bible using Energize materials. So far we have looked at the stories of Noah, Abraham, Joseph and Moses and will be moving onto Joshua and Gideon in October.

We prepared for and took part in a special All Age Service for Harvest on 24th September. Children from Sunday Club did the bible readings, helped welcome people on arrival, carried in the Bible and brought up the offering. We also led the congregation in a Harvest samba song that we had learnt. It was great to see so many children there and taking part.





We have 2 Funday Sundays coming up in October during half-term, as well as Godly Play on the last Sunday in October. At the heart of Godly Play is God's Word in the form of a special story during which a calm, reflective atmosphere is promoted. This is followed by a "feast" of fruit, biscuits and juice, which is served and shared. The children then choose for themselves ways to respond by participating in a variety of crafts.

Update on Sunday Club Sponsorship of Rimberto from Bolivia

As you will know, we have committed to sponsoring through World Vision, Rimberto, a young boy from Bolivia. The children keep up-to-date with Rimberto's progress through frequent reports received from World Vision. This allows them to better understand the lives of children growing up in very different circumstances and to pray for Rimberto and his family and community in a relevant and intercessional way.

Harvest Appeal

As part of our Harvest Thanksgiving Celebrations, as well as inviting donations for our local Foodbank at the Service, we usually hold a financial appeal in the subsequent weeks. The beneficiaries are various charities, whether local, national or international (and usually a combination of these).

However, due to the current economic difficulties facing all of us, and in light of other good causes being promoted by our church at present, the Kirk Session has decided not to hold a specific financial appeal this year, but to encourage people to support the two projects currently being publicised -



Blythswood Care Shoe Box Appeal – the annual project to fill shoe boxes with goods and gifts for transportation to people living in dire poverty in Eastern Europe in time for Christmas (complete with appropriate Christian literature). It costs £7,000 to transport a lorry-load of shoe boxes to Eastern Europe, so financial contributions are always most welcome.



Christian Aid Libya Floods Appeal – to help local responders make a huge difference to so many people who have lost their homes, livelihoods and loved ones where thousands have died after a catastrophic storm burst two dams, causing widespread flooding in Eastern Libya.

More details of the two projects can be found below.

The hope is that financial donations will be made direct to the charities concerned (or as otherwise suggested in the articles in this "Journal"). However, there will be specific collection boxes at the back of the Church during October (one for each charity and one for any joint gifts – which will be split equally) for anyone who wishes to give (whether anonymously or using one of our Appeal envelopes).

Lesley & David Balfour - a manna tribute

Lesley - The Queen of Cakes

Lesley was one of manna's most regular bakers. She baked on Saturdays until she retired in 2018 when she very generously changed this to Thursdays and Saturdays. Bakes were either an elaborate cake or 2 loaves. Delivery time was 2pm on the dot; more often than not the Saturday cake was needed straight away depending on the level of busyness of the morning. This cake was usually carried in by David, where we had the standing joke of me saying, "I see you have had a busy morning, David, what have you made? " The cake was then enjoyed by Lesley herself and the rest of her family who have a regular Saturday 2pm booking.





Her creations were never simple, always a combination of 2 or 3 flavours e.g. mango, coconut and lime, lemon and blueberry, white chocolate, raspberry and coconut were favourites. Loaves also came iced with buttercream and decorations which clearly marked out a "slice". Her Christmas cake bites were eagerly anticipated every December with customers waiting on the arrival of festive bakes. When asked she would say, "I found the recipe on the internet and I just threw it together!"

I (Morag) try to email the 19 or so bakers every Friday morning by 10am, however sometimes this does not work out if I get a volunteer cancel on the morning and have to fill the shift myself. Therefore the email would be forgotten; however come Saturday at 2pm, Lesley would appear with baking anyway telling me "There was no email, but I made a cake anyway, hope that's all right!"

In lockdown, Lesley was one of the bakers who agreed to help with the venture of baking treats for the NHS and local key workers. As she was shielding, it involved Andrew and I delivering bags of flour, sugar, etc., to her house in exchange for individually wrapped pieces of baking. This was quite hard work - if you have walked up the hill to her house carrying several kilograms of supplies in what was a warm summer you will know what I mean. However we were treated to a cuppa and seat in her garden (which she was immensely proud of) and we had a good chat about all things baking and DIY.





She was able to find recipes to suit ingredients using fruits that are donated to manna, especially around Autumn, e.g. apples and plums. I would email round and say we had been given these fruits and Lesley would be one of the first into manna to collect them to see if she could find a recipe to use them.

Lesley was very organised and regularly emailed me with dates when she could bake and times when she couldn't bake, mainly when there was DIY to be done, family gatherings and holiday times. We were talking just a few days before her tragic accident about the cake she had just brought in and about our upcoming holidays.

All of her immense contributions to manna baking was summed up in Graham's eulogy, with me remarking on more than one occasion how many recipe cards she had, even sub-divided into categories.

Lesley and her bakes will be sorely missed by manna.

David - Mr Odd Job & Volunteer

There are so many things around manna that David helped us fix over the years. From outside, if you look above the doors there are red curtains - they were designed and made by Lesley & David. In the gift shop our clear plastic shelves were installed by David. David also donated the tiles for our storeroom floor and laid them. Doors that didn't work properly,

handles that became undone, toilet seats that became loose - David fixed them. Taps were another issue. David would research and find replacements for us. He was always happy to give me the benefit of his expertise to what ever odd job came up in manna. He always gave good advice and was able to tell us if we needed a plumber or electrician to do certain jobs.

David also volunteered for a time in manna. Very handy for getting things down from high shelves! Male volunteers are in the minority and his volunteering was greatly appreciated. David was very kind and very generous with his time and gifts.

We are so grateful to have had his help over many years.





David & Lesley - The Customers

David and Lesley met in manna most Saturdays along with Lesley's two sisters Jane and Jennifer and any other family members who were free. We would reserve a table for 4-8 and they would arrive with a cake or loaves. Their order only changed slightly recently by changing to decaf lattes. This was to be enjoyed along with a slice of cake which could often be one of Lesley's. When we attended their funerals many of the stories recalled had been told over coffees in manna; the trip to Disneyland Paris, the many Munros they climbed, weddings and holidays. Their last visit to manna was on Saturday 12th August; they were so looking forward to their trip to America leaving a few days later. Hard to believe that was the last time we saw them both. They lived life to the full and we were privileged to be part of their lives and they were part of ours.

Rest in peace and thank you for being so much a part of our manna family.

The exhibition will then be moved into the church so that Saturday evening concert-goers and Sunday morning service attendees may view it there.
