

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Navigating Transitions with Faith: A Journey of Reflection and Hope

On the 29th January 2024, I was at the helm of a daunting task, appointed by the Fife Presbytery Business Committee. My role was to lead a task group in deciding the future of four Kirkcaldy Town Churches, a mission that would prove to be one of the most challenging of my career with the Church of Scotland. The prospect of closing churches, each a storied haven where generations have found solace and spiritual sustenance, was a burden that weighed heavily on my heart. The stories shared by congregants, of baptisms and lifelong spiritual journeys within these sacred walls, spoke of a deep connection that transcended mere bricks and mortar. Tales of community service, shared spaces with other faith groups, and even the home of the "country's finest organ", were

testimonies to the irreplaceable role these churches played in their communities. Echoing the sentiments of my fellow committee members, the idea of closure was met with reluctance and sorrow. Yet, the directive was clear: two would remain open, and two would close. This decision, though difficult, was made with a heavy heart and a prayerful spirit.

As we witness transformations within the Church of Scotland, I am reminded of my homeland, Cameroon, where the quest for worship spaces turns cinemas, nightclubs, and even pubs into sanctuaries of faith. This stark contrast with the secularisation and dwindling church attendance in Europe and parts of North America is a poignant reminder of the universal challenge of maintaining our spiritual homes in a rapidly changing world.

Our commitment to purposeful and fitting spaces for worship is unwavering. Where buildings may no longer serve their original purpose, the path forward should involve collaboration and creativity. The goal should not merely be to decide the fate of our structures but to reimagine how they can continue to serve our communities, guided by the Presbytery's wisdom and achievable targets.

Our local cluster of churches is also undergoing a transformation, with Wormit and Balmerino forming a union and potential future linkage with Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland. These changes prompt us to lean into prayer, seeking divine guidance to ensure our decisions honour the mission of the Church of Scotland and the spiritual wellbeing of our communities. In light of these transitions, we recall the five principles of mission that guide our path: proclaiming the Good News, nurturing new believers, serving with love, seeking justice and peace, and caring for creation. These principles remind us of our calling and our responsibility to the world around us.

In this time of transition, we hold fast to the words of Ecclesiastes 3:1, "to everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven." Let us move forward with the strength and tenacity of our faith, supporting one another in times of change and loss. May God bless our church in Newport-on-Tay, guiding us to make decisions that reflect His love and wisdom, and ensuring a future where our community continues to flourish in faith and fellowship.

Report from Presbytery on Amos's Tenure

Back in 2017, when our previous minister retired, St Andrews Presbytery allowed us to call a new minister but imposed a condition that our minister's tenure should be reviewed in 7 years. This was in line with the General Assembly's instruction to all Presbyteries to create a plan to address the dwindling numbers of members and ministers and a drop in income in the Kirk nationally.

Fife Presbytery has now carried out the review and has extended the review period to May 2027. We will then be reviewed on:

- · whether the life of the congregation exhibits The Five Marks of Mission; and
- the extent to which the Presbytery Mission Plan for North Fife has been implemented

The Presbytery Mission Plan requires us to develop and form a union with Wormit and Balmerino and Creich, Flisk and Kilmany and the Presbytery report says that the extension of the review will provide space for further progress with this.

As part of the review, we were visited by representatives from Presbytery. This is what they said about us:-

"The congregation is active and missional through (amongst other things) the active Guild, Worship Group, Sunday Club, Funday Sunday, Youth Seekers, Youth Worker in the congregation and school, Wednesday Afternoon Club, Sunday Coffee Team, Christian Aid, Malawi Partnership, Online Church, Holiday Club, Bible Alive and especially the manna Café. It was a joy to hear about these aspects of the church life."

Our Kirk Session will be working on being a missional church and will be working towards the union of the churches in this corner of Fife.

The Five Marks of Mission

The Five Marks of Mission were endorsed by the General Assembly of October 2020 and are as follows:

- ◆ To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- ◆ To respond to human need by loving service
- ◆ To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- ♦ To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

The mission of the Church is the mission of Christ.

Sunday Club Update

Teaching in February and March

We are continuing our series of sessions looking at things that make up the Christian character. The younger children have been creating a tree with a trunk for trust and leaves of love, joy, peace and patience so far. We also created a patience wall. We will move on to kindness, goodness and faithfulness next.

Our first session in February was Godly Play, in which the story of Noah's Ark was explored. At the heart of Godly Play is God's Word in the form of a special story during which a calm, reflective atmosphere is promoted. This is followed

by a "feast" of fruit, biscuits and juice, which is served and shared. The children then choose for themselves ways to respond by participating in a variety of crafts. On 18th February we thought about how and why we mark the season of Lent. The children thought about what they might do this Lent to make time and space to be closer to God.



Youth Update

At the time of writing this newsletter I am off to Berlin for a few days, for a wee city break with a friend, after our February Messy Church. Only I would think that was a good idea! Anyway, before we get into our Youth Ministries Update for February I would like to say huge thank you to all our volunteers who help run our ministries. Without them, we wouldn't be able to do as much as we do. We have seen some amazing growth in different areas of our ministry, both of faith and in new people coming along. We are looking forward to what the rest of 2024 has in store. Below is a bit more information about what we are doing in our ministries. I hope that this update will be encouraging to you and please keep us in your prayers as we look forward to what is happening in the next couple of months.

<u>Spark (Formerly Youth Seekers)</u>
We have finished our series on Paul, where we ended by creating a timeline of the most significant events and points in his life. It has been a real whirlwind and it has been great to learn more about one of the great men of faith from the Bible. We don't know what we are going to be doing next but will be discussing our options at the beginning of March.

<u>Ignite (Formerly Youth Café)</u>

We are reading and discussing some of Paul's writings in the letters he wrote. We have looked at the Armour of God, being men and women of faith, fruits of the Holy Spirit, as a couple of examples.

Soon we will be discovering the gifts that we are given by God. We will also be doing an Art evening on 17th March where we will be looking at the Creation Story and painting our interpretation of each day in the Creation Story.

Soon we hope to be creating a video of the Easter Story from eyewitness perspectives. We are looking forward to what God has in store for us over the next couple of months.

Discipleship Group

This is a group for S4+ pupils who want to delve more into the bible. We meet in manna every second Friday at 2.30pm. For the next 7 meetings we are looking at a bible study called Better by Jen Wilkin, which is helping us to read and understand the book of Hebrews.

Our group of four are beginning our journey together where we are deepening our faith and discipling one another. It has been great to teach and learn from our wonderful young people! Our next meeting is on Friday 8th March.

Messy Church

At the time of writing, we have just had our February Messy Church and our theme was God's love for us. We specifically looked at the Parables of The Lost Coin, The Lost Sheep and The Prodigal Son. We had dramatised parables, where our children and adults had the chance to act out the parables with costumes and props; we also had 3D decorative hearts, Mother's Day cards, and Finding The Lost where we "lost" a sheep, a coin and a Woody (representing the lost son) in the main church and had our families go and find them!

It was great fun and we had 3 new families that came and joined us, which is exciting! Next month we are pushing back the start time of Messy Church to 11am - 1pm, with the hope that those who have classes on in the morning can come and have more time to participate in the craft and activities! Our next meeting is on Saturday 30th March, where we will have an Easter theme, as it is Easter Weekend!

Bible Alive

We have had the privilege of being able to go into Newport Primary to the amazing P6 class and go through the bible and bring it to life. We have had six weeks so far, and our final week is the last Wednesday in February, where we will be going from the resurrection of Jesus all the way through to Revelation. It is going to be a whopper of an hour and we are so looking forward to it! The P6 class has been phenomenal, energetic, excited and getting stuck in with the drama, dress up, challenges, guizzes and learning different stories and parts from the bible!

As I said in my introduction to this article, we couldn't run these amazing events and groups without our volunteers. However, we do need your help. Embracing New Beginnings: A Joyous Easter Celebration

It only feels like yesterday since I was drafting an article for the Winter edition of our Church Journal. We now already find ourselves again on the threshold of a season synonymous with hope, renewal and new beginnings; in the heart of our beautiful church, Easter takes on a very special and significant role, not only as the celebration of the resurrection of Christ, but also as a reminder of hope and promise that this season in the church calendar may bring.



Easter aligns perfectly with the season of spring, where nature awakens from a winter hibernation and we begin to see the flowers sprout out of the ground and the trees blossom vibrant, bright and earthy colours. We see the little lambs frolicking in the fields, finding their way in the world, and best of all, our days are longer and the nights are shorter. The church embraces this connection, drawing parallels between rebirth, nature and the everlasting faith in our hearts.

Many of us can relate to new beginnings; a friend recently phoned me to say she will be moving house with her parents, which is incredibly exciting news. Earlier last week, I attended an assembly at school for the first time in many years, where one of the fifth year pupils gave a talk about his mother's journey from

being diagnosed with an aggressive form of cancer, to the start of her new beginnings when she was given the all clear and finding a way to move forward by supporting others suffering a similar condition. While I could see the pain in his eyes as he spoke, he reiterated that the love and support of others held them together. New beginnings may also relate to a new job (or leaving a particularly horrible one), starting a daily exercise routine, or even reconnecting with someone from the past. 'New beginnings' could perhaps mean coming to terms with grief, acceptance or closure.

As the forty days and forty nights draw to a close, and in this season of resurrection, I hope each of us have the strength to embark on a journey of new beginnings, no matter how big or small, guided by the resurrection story and always in the light and out of the darkness. In classic organist style, I look forward to echoing the triumphant strains of 'Thine be the Glory', at full organ and full choir on Easter morning and whatever the musical treats in the Order of Service on the 31st March may bring us.

On a personal level of new beginnings, Ray and I are expecting a baby, due on the 25th June 2024. We are incredibly delighted and look forward to the journey of parenthood, nappy changes and creating many happy memories! New beginnings for the baby will not only be when he/she is born, but on the one hundredth day. In Chinese culture, it commemorates a new life entering society, dressed in red and gold to represent prosperity, and the paternal grandfather announcing the baby's name. And, most likely followed by a traditional Chan feast!
