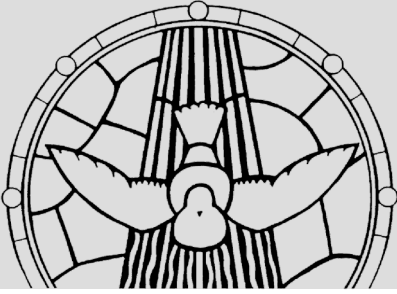

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Easter 2024

1 Timothy 2 v 5 - 6 : The Indispensable Mediator

"For there is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all people. This has now been witnessed to at the proper time."

One of the most important aspects of the Lenten Season is that it invites us to reflect on the essence of mediation and its importance in faith, particularly in the Christian understanding of reconciliation between God and humankind. As we celebrate Easter, I wish to reflect on the concept of Jesus as the mediator, exploring why such an intermediary is indispensable and why Jesus Christ alone fulfils this role.



The idea of a mediator is ubiquitous in our lives. For example, distinguished and world class bodies, like the United Nations, aim to resolve conflicts between nations while marriage counsellors strive to mend relationships between spouses. However, the notion of mediation takes on a deeper, more critical role in spiritual discourse—especially in Christianity, which uniquely insists on the necessity of a mediator between God and people.

Anselm of Canterbury and Dietrich Bonhoeffer spoke of the gravity of sin and the ongoing spiritual struggle, underscoring why mere human initiative is inadequate for true reconciliation with God. The discrepancy between human disputes and our estrangement from God is vast. Our disagreements with each other are often petty and easily mendable without a third party, but our rift with God is of a different order—it is a rebellion against our Creator, that always requires divine intervention for restoration.

Jesus Christ is positioned as the sole mediator because of his unique nature and his redemptive actions. He was fully divine and fully human, paying the ultimate price—a ransom with His life—to liberate us from the bondage of sin. His death and resurrection were acts of atonement which underscore His unparalleled position as the mediator. 1 Timothy 2:5-6 teaches that no other being shares the dual nature of Jesus—God incarnate who entered our human condition, only to offer Himself as a ransom. His qualifications are unrivalled, His sacrifice unparalleled, and His mediation unmatched in any other faith tradition.

The significance of this theological truth is deeply personal and exclusive. It challenges notions of broad-mindedness that suggest all paths lead to God, and instead asserts the necessity of Christ's mediation. In recognising Jesus as the sole qualified saviour, we are invited to embrace Him as our mediator, the only one capable of restoring us to a right relationship with God.

Easter joy is found in the acceptance of this truth. Christ's mediation is not just a doctrinal point but the very means of our spiritual freedom and the foundation for a life dedicated to His service. As we celebrate Easter, let us rejoice in the living hope and the joyous freedom brought forth through Christ, the Mediator. In His resurrection, we find the affirmation of His unique role in our lives, promising us not only reconciliation but also the joy of eternal life.

Maundy Money

We are delighted that two of our elders, Mrs Elizabeth Thomson and Mr Philip Owen, were among six Church of Scotland members who received Maundy Money from Her Majesty The Queen, on behalf of His Majesty The King, at Worcester Cathedral on 28th March 2024. A total of 75 men and 75 women from across the United Kingdom received the award after being nominated for their dedicated years of Christian service to the Church and community.

The tradition of presenting alms on Maundy Thursday dates back to at least the 4th century AD with the first record of a monarch doing this in the British Isles being in 1213. The service is held at a different cathedral in England each year, and the number of both men and women being given Maundy Money is the same as the monarch's age. The word 'Maundy' comes from the Latin word for 'commandment', which refers to the instruction that Jesus gave his disciples on the Thursday before he died "that you should love one another as I have loved you".

Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton (Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland) said, "I am delighted that six long-serving and dedicated members of the Church of Scotland are being recognised in this way. They are people who have served their congregations and communities faithfully, giving up their time to help others."

Elizabeth said, "I was extremely surprised to receive the letter from Buckingham Palace telling me that I had been nominated to receive Maundy Money for service to the Church and to the Community. When I got over the shock I felt very honoured and at the same time humbled. The service in Worcester Cathedral at which we were presented with the Maundy coins by the Queen was a grand and uplifting occasion. I felt very privileged to be part of it."



Philip said, "I am elated and proud, but at the same time very humbled that I was chosen. I have a mixture of pride, surprise and humility to have been recommended and approved to receive this honour. While looking back over a number of decades of Christian service - whether through the Boys' Brigade, Church finance or leading Church worship - it had always been done as a service to others. Consequently this recognition reflects equally on our Church locally and on the other, generally unsung, volunteers who help in ministry and mission here and across the land."

Teaching in March and April

We are continuing our series of sessions looking at things that make up the Christian character. We have added some kindness leaves to the tree we have been making. Youth Update

This past month has been a very busy one with all our activities that we have been up to and which we have coming up. Hopefully this update can give you a glimpse of what we have been doing as a ministry and I am looking forward to next month!

Spark (Formerly Youth Seekers)

At Spark we have been discussing what we would like to learn about from the Bible and/or about Christianity and collectively decided to learn more about David from the Bible. A few weeks ago, we covered an overview of David's life and last week we looked at David the musician. After the Easter holidays, we will continue to delve into David's life and how we can apply the lessons we learn from his life to us today.

Ignite (Formerly Youth Café)

This past month our Sunday evening youth group have been getting creative and arty. I tasked our gifted young people to come up with different paintings for each of the 7 Days of our Creation story. They look incredible and we are looking forward to using them in Bible Alive next year, as well as potentially during a children's talk.



Discipleship Group

We are carrying on with our bible study Better by Jen Wilkin, where we are going through the book of Hebrews. It has been very insightful to learn with our young people and we are looking forward to meeting up every two weeks.

Messy Church

We have just had our Easter Messy Church where we made sand crosses, Easter Story Cookies, had an Easter Egg Hunt and more. We also used a teaching aid called Resurrection Eggs, where in each plastic egg there is an item to do with the easter story, we then put them in the right order and retold the Easter story.

Our next Messy Church is on Saturday 27th April from 11am – 1pm.

Easter Code

We had our final curriculum event of the year in Newport Primary School with Easter Code, where members of our church helped walk our P7's through the week between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. We talked about The Last Supper and some of the children tasted some food they may have eaten there; we had a station dedicated to foot washing, another one for the Garden of Gethsemane, another one for the Trial of Jesus and a craft dedicated to Golgotha. We are so privileged that we can do these events in our local school, and it was a roaring success! Thank you to Bill Imlay, Graham Johnston, Ruth Bearn, Alison Heywood, Kevin and Jane Campbell who delivered this material fantastically and the kids had a great time!

Primary School May Weekend Camp

Olivier Messiaen and The Ascension

One of the finest pieces of organ music composed by Olivier Messiaen is the monumental 'L'Ascension', a colourful suite that draws upon the theme of the composer's deepest spiritual connection to the church and the desire to paint his visions and beliefs through the elegance of the organ.

Completed by 1922, it is a four-movement work that explores the subject of the Ascension of Jesus Christ, a theme that aligns closely to Messiaen's devotion to the catholic church and drawing inspiration from the sacred narratives in the bible. Another example of this is 'La Nativite du Seigneur', a masterpiece that tells the story of the birth of Jesus through nine vibrant and imaginative movements.

The connection between L'Ascension and the church is firstly evident by the choice of instrument – the organ. The organ is often referred to as the 'King of Instruments', owing to the many sounds it can produce from the string, woodwind and brass family, and has a long-standing relationship with the church, dating back to the 3rd century BC in Ancient Greece. The colourful tones allow the organ to paint pictures, tell stories and provoke the imagination in many ways, shapes and forms; 20th century composers are brilliant storytellers, looking to nature such as birdsong for inspiration, personal experiences like trauma (Messiaen was a prisoner during WW2 and wrote pieces for instruments he had available in the camp at the time) or places that hold some sort of significance.

I performed L'Ascension twice around a decade ago: the first time at Bradford Cathedral and the second at Palmerston Place, Edinburgh. Journeying with this suite over four months was tough from a technical point of view, but one of the most rewarding experiences in my performance career.



Some of you may be wondering why you have never heard L'Ascension or La Nativite du Seigneur in the time I've been in post. Our instrument is versatile, but it does not have the tonal sounds or acoustic which would allow me to tell the story convincingly. The harmonies may not necessarily agree with your ear, however, if you are able to listen to the suite on a suitable instrument in a larger space, I promise that you will be in for a treat.

Each movement is unique: the first movement sets a majestic tone ('Majesty of Christ asking for His Glory from His Father'), the second ('Serene alleluias of a soul that longs for heaven') is an ethereal and delicate masterpiece that creates a heavenly atmosphere using the softer registers of the organ, the third ('Journey to joy') is a jubilant celebration in the bright key of F sharp major (a key often associated with heaven), in the form of a fast, vibrant toccata, and the final movement ('Prayer of Christ ascending towards His Father') draws the suite to a reflective and poignant conclusion, having traversed through the layers of spirituality and emotional depth in the space of 25 minutes.

Messiaen certainly does not fail in sweeping us along on a journey that explores the themes of faith, the divine and transcendence. Not only do we experience the music in an eccentric blend of sounds and rhythms, we also experience a spiritual pilgrimage guided by a visionary genius who was dedicated to his strong faith and devotion to the church.
