



Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland Journal May 2024

MINISTER'S MESSAGE





As the Church of Scotland faces significant structural changes and a shortage of ministers, the communities of Newport-on-Tay, Wormit, Balmerino and Creich, Flisk & Kilmany stand at a critical juncture. The Presbytery of Fife has designated these parishes as a missionary hub, a move poised to reshape our common goals and strategies. This new directive can be aligned with the biblical teachings of Matthew 28 : 19-20, emphasising the importance of making disciples, baptising them, and nurturing their spiritual growth. These efforts resonate deeply with the foundational aspects of our mission, focusing primarily on evangelism and education.

The vision of the Church of Scotland is to build vibrant, mission-driven communities. This requires a fresh approach to uniting our parishes and enhancing our outreach activities. The five marks of mission provide a structured path forward, guiding us in creating more effective and enduring missionary efforts.

Our strategy should include maintaining our cherished traditions while embracing innovative methods. This might include using digital media to extend our reach and developing interactive online Bible studies. Regular feedback and digital analytics will help us fine-tune these initiatives. In nurturing new believers, we should continue to hold small group meetings and Sunday school classes, but also expand our discipleship programmes to include mentorship and life stage-specific tracks. Monitoring and feedback would be integral to these processes, ensuring we meet the spiritual needs of our community. Our response to human need currently extends to partnering with local charities but would need to include launching direct service programmes, such as job training and mental health support. The impact of these programmes will be evaluated through community feedback and participant testimonials. We also strive to transform unjust societal structures by advocating for change and partnering with other organisations for a greater impact. Feedback from local communities and government would help assess the effectiveness of these efforts. Furthermore, we all need to be committed to environmental stewardship, launching projects like community gardens, and promoting renewable energy initiatives, with ongoing evaluations to monitor our environmental impact.

If we implement these strategies, rooted in scriptural teachings, our churches would be uniquely equipped to navigate the complexities of modern ministry. The success of our mission-oriented community hinges on the collective efforts of our congregations and leaders.

This month, we look forward to an Elders Conference in Newport-on-Tay on the 18th. It promises to be a time of fruitful discussion and reflection on the future of our church and its mission. I invite everyone to engage, whether through active participation or prayer, as we seek to make a positive impact on our community and beyond.

May this redefined mission invigorate our faith and actions as we continue to serve in His name.

Baptism is truly at the heart of an amazing journey of faith

April 7th ... and we have just returned from another joyous service at Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland, learning about Thomas who, like ourselves, had doubts and questions that needed answering to reaffirm his faith. It also featured our wonderful choir who gave us a beautiful rendition of the Brahms Anthem 'Lord, lead us still'. Once again it was a privilege to attend and witness the joy, friendship and fellowship shared in that sacred space.

It will come as no surprise to realise that we as we go through life, we are continually asking our Lord Jesus for help of one kind or another. Indeed, it is a comforting thought to me to know that I am not alone; that in times of need I can confide in a Christian Sister or Brother and share my worries and concerns freely with them, before giving them all up to the Lord in prayer.

I have been a Christian since I was 18 years old and about to start my nursing career at the Western General Hospital in Edinburgh, embarking on a three-year training course. I asked the Lord Jesus into my life whilst attending Granton Baptist Church, a lively, energetic place of worship located near to the Hospital, and sought to reaffirm this spiritual commitment through Adult Baptism. My Father, an Elder in the Church of Scotland, however did not approve – after all in his opinion I had been Christened as a Baby and he didn't, couldn't see the need. However, my mother (herself a Baptist), my sister and boyfriend Francis did attend the service.

Immersed in water – it was the most thrilling, albeit perishingly cold, experience of my life, as I bore witness to asking Jesus into my life, as my Personal Saviour! This commitment was undoubtedly in response to God's calling in my life, as He not only prepared me to share His love, grace and healing with the patients I encountered on the wards, but also to console and protect me through the sad times and the many traumas I would witness throughout my nursing career.

Whenever it happens, whether as a baby, child or adult, and in whatever form or Christian Tradition it takes place, baptism is truly at the heart of an amazing personal journey of faith as a follower of Jesus Christ.

Lest We Forget, the Newport History Group's follow-up book to their 2022 Poppy Project, has been chosen as Winner of the Alan Ball Award for Best Community History Project publication 2023. This is a national (UK) award so they are extremely proud. (Google Alan Ball Awards for more information.)

Here is what the judges thought of the book/project.

"I am delighted to let you know that Lest We Forget has been awarded the Winner of the Alan Ball Award for Best Community History Project publication 2023. There were a number of strong entries, but the judges felt that this was a brilliantly researched and written publication that had arisen out of a very special project, which clearly is the result of enthusiastic community engagement, notably including young people. The project provides a creative way in which people can learn about the sacrifices made by those members of the Newport community during World War 1 and 2, and how this has impacted upon the burgh of Newport on Tay and its heritage. It provides an important record and you should all be proud of what you have achieved."

It's just fabulous that this project has been appreciated at another level. As it evolved the group knew it was pretty special, and the overwhelming response from the local community confirmed that, and of course they were particularly gratified at the enthusiasm of the local school children who were involved.

Sunday Club Update

Teaching in April and May

Christian Aid News

Christian Aid Week

Christian Aid Week runs from 12th -18th May and the familiar red donation envelopes will be in the church.

This year Christian Aid is highlighting the situation in Burundi through the experience of one woman, Aline, who was pushed to the brink of survival. In her province more than 70% of the population live in poverty and more than 50% of the children are underweight and underdeveloped. Most people eat only once a day.

Aline's violent and abusive husband threw her out leaving her to live on the streets without money or work. Aline was in despair. However she became involved in a community workshop where the trainers had been funded by Christian Aid. They provided some basic business training to the group. Aline was then able to set up a small grocery wholesale business and eventually rent a house. Her three children now live with her and she can provide food and clothes for them. Such an enormous change for this family from a Christian Aid funded initiative.

The Merry Month of May

Stepping into the month of May, we are greeted with warmer temperatures, sunny skies, blossoming nature and vibrant colours that we longed to envisage during the colder winter months. The month of May holds a special place in many of our hearts; the warmth of the sun brings us a great deal of happiness and encourages us to spend more time outdoors after enduring a long period of erratic, unpredictable Scottish weather. This month is also significant for those in education; many of you will remember sitting your exams at school, college or university and then breathing a huge sigh of relief when it was all over.

A choral piece that captures the essence of May is William Byrd's 'This Sweet and Merry Month of May', from the collection of 'Italian Madrigals Englished'. Byrd is a prominent composer of the Renaissance era, at the time of discovery, exploration and development, particularly in science, literature and music. Byrd gifted us with several masterpieces, however this one stands out as a delightful ode to the joys of spring time, glee and rebirth.

A madrigal would normally be written in Italian, however Byrd adapted his into English. In the 16th century, the madrigal form was highly popular and very much characterised by elaborate vocal harmonies, infectious melodies and on occasion, the refrain 'fa la la la la'. The lyrics generate imagery of nature, happiness and optimism, and ever fails to encourage us to dance or sway along to the rich sounds of this intricate, timeless classic. It is a charming piece of poetry, mirrored in the music to bring the lyrics to life by using devices such as lilting phrases and delicate ornamentation:



'This sweet and merry month of May, While Nature wantons in her prime, And birds do sing, and beasts do play, For pleasure of the joyful time, I choose the first for holy day, And greet Eliza with a rhyme. O beauteous Queen of second Troy: Take well in worth a simple toy.'

I hope you enjoy listening to this madrigal and wishing you a very merry month of May!
