

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Pentecost and the Summer Season: A Time of Renewal and Mission in Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland

As the summer sun illuminates our days in Newport-on-Tay, the celebration of Pentecost offers a perfect moment for reflection. This feast, observed fifty days after Easter, commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and marks the birth of the Christian Church. More than a historical event, Pentecost is a reminder of the Holy Spirit's ongoing presence and guidance in our church community. Through this celebration, we are inspired anew by the Spirit's active role in our lives, empowering us to continue God's work with renewed faith and commitment. The roots of Pentecost can be traced back to the early Christian Church. The Apostolic Constitutions, written in the 4th century, indicate that Pentecost was already an established feast, signifying its early importance. Over the

centuries, Pentecost grew in significance alongside Easter and Christmas, becoming a major celebration in the liturgical calendar. During the Middle Ages, it was closely associated with the confirmation of new Christians, symbolising the completion of their initiation into the faith. This tradition highlights the ongoing transformative work of the Holy Spirit in the life of believers and the Church. Pentecost remains profoundly relevant, emphasising the Holy Spirit's continuous presence and activity within the Church. Several key themes from the Pentecost event resonate deeply with our current mission and activities at Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland:

- 1. Empowerment for Mission: The Holy Spirit empowered the apostles to speak in various languages, symbolising the universal nature of the Christian mission. At Newport-on-Tay, this empowerment inspires us in our evangelistic activities, from Sunday morning worship and evening Communion services. Our outreach efforts, such as Youth Work, Children's ministry, and services at Care Homes, reflect this mission-driven empowerment, aiming to spread the Gospel and serve our community faithfully.
- 2. Unity in Diversity: The miracle of speaking in different tongues during Pentecost underscores the inclusive nature of the Christian message. In our diverse and interconnected world, this message of unity amidst diversity is especially relevant. At our church, we embrace multiculturalism and promote reconciliation, ensuring that our manna cafe and other initiatives serve as welcoming spaces for all members of our community.
- 3. Transformation and Renewal: The Pentecost experience was transformative for the early believers, renewing their spirits and fostering a sense of communal purpose. Today, we are reminded of the Holy Spirit's role in personal and communal renewal. Our prayer is that each time we commemorate Pentecost, we receive a fresh anointing from God, empowering us to continue His work in the world with renewed vigour and commitment.
- 4. Continuation of Jesus' Ministry: The Holy Spirit enables believers to continue Jesus' ministry, performing acts of healing, teaching and service. At Newport-on-Tay, we see this in action through our outreach to Care Homes, where we provide spiritual support and services, and through our various community engagement initiatives. This continuity underscores our role in manifesting Christ's love and compassion in tangible ways.

As we journey through the summer season, let us be mindful of the Holy Spirit's guidance and empowerment in all our endeavours. From worship services to community outreach, we seek the Spirit's wisdom and strength to love and serve our community more faithfully. Let the words of Acts 1:8 resonate with us: "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." This verse encapsulates our mission as a church, encouraging us to be witnesses of Christ's love and grace in Newport-on-Tay and beyond. As we enjoy the sunshine of summer and look forward to the future with hope, we trust in God's providence, knowing that He holds our future in His hands.

Moving on - a time to celebrate.

"They say that breaking up is hard to do, Now I know, I know that it's true. Don't say that this is the end, Instead of breaking up, I wish we were making up again."

Reading the May 2024 Sunday Club update in our last Journal, which details the change of child sponsored by the children through World Vision, it could be so easy to agree with these lyrics by Neil Sedaka and feel sad about the break-up. Having spent the last few years getting to know and learn more about Rimberto and his life experiences in Bolivia, it could be perceived as heart-breaking for the children to say farewell to such a well-established connection. On the contrary, it is a time for celebration and rejoicing, as this break-up signals a significant milestone having been reached in the life cycle of this particular World Vision Project.

As projects reach their fruition and all proposed outcomes are met, it is time for the Community to take over the reins and continue along the same sustainable developmental pathway, as initiated by the World Vision project team. It was a privilege for Linda and I to visit one such project celebration in Kayezi, Malawi, in 2018 and to witness for ourselves the significant strides made in transforming not only the life of our sponsored children, but also the advances made by the entire Community. Since then, we too have had to say our own goodbye to 'Happy' and his family and have since been assigned a new child, 'Precious', in another project in a different part of Malawi.

World Vision strongly believe that the best way to change a child's life is to transform their whole community, and Child Sponsorship means helping communities to help themselves by tackling the root causes of poverty. For each child sponsored, four more ultimately benefit from this life-changing transformation.

Firstly, they work with local leaders and families to understand their struggles and the areas where they need support. Together, they focus on helping the most vulnerable children in the greatest need – those at risk of the worst poverty, exploitation, and abuse. Then they create a plan to transform the community into a safe place, where children are cared for and protected, long into the future. This maximises the impact of sponsorship – empowering communities to break free from poverty and become totally self-sustaining by providing the essentials they need to build a better future, such as clean water, education, healthcare facilities, nutritious food, protection, and job opportunities.

Each project has however a target completion date, a time when all the initiatives and supportive measures culminate, and the responsibility for the future is transferred to the Community, led by its trained and now fully competent leadership team. It is a time to celebrate God's goodness and continuing provision, before moving on to another area of great need, featuring another child, living in another

community. I wish every blessing on our Sunday Člub as they embark on a new and exciting relationship with Subair from Mozambique.

We are looking forward to having a break over the summer months and be ready to restart once the schools have returned. Things will be a bit different then, as most of our boys will be of an age to join the Company Section and we will need to schedule separate times and activities for them.

Obviously, this will mean a very small number of boys remain in the Juniors, but we expect to be able to be allowed into the local primary schools to speak with the boys there and hopefully encourage many of them to come along and join us on Friday evenings - whether for Anchors (P2 – P3), Juniors (P4 – P6) or Company Section (P7 to S3). Please keep these matters in your prayers, especially over the coming weeks.

We all wish you a relaxing summer and look forward to enjoying the break before things all start up again in the autumn!




If you don't feel able to come in person, we are continuing Zooming the Vigils. If you would like to join please ask me (Neil Merrylees) or Claire Owen for the link.

In the summer of 2019, I made the decision that it was time to move back to Scotland, 'the best country in the world', as I explained to my friends down south, as they regularly mocked my mild Scottish accent. As far back as 2016, I was constantly looking for jobs over the border in the hope that something would appear but either I was not searching in the right place or I was just unlucky. I missed my family very much, however, I knew how difficult the job market was for music, especially if you are an organist. In England, I was playing for concerts two or three times a month, played as many as seven services between Saturday and Sunday evening, and at most, five or six funerals a week and three or four weddings a month. I won't include all the dodgy functions I ended up playing at ('The Black Country Beauty Queens' in West Bromwich Town Hall was by far the worst) but it's all good character building, even if I performed with a face like a torn scone.

In a remarkable turn of events, the day I decided to move back was also the same day that my Dad phoned to say that Garry Fraser was retiring as the organist from our church, after 20 years in service. I couldn't believe my luck; I thought I would end up church hopping from week to week like I was in Worcestershire and Birmingham and wouldn't be able to find any stability.

Fast forward four years and eight months later, I'm still here, and incredibly grateful to be part of this close knit community. Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland truly is a unique place, not only as a place of worship, but the people who walk in and out of the main doors every week and especially the people who run everything behind the scenes keep the church alive and thriving.



Ray and I would like to say a huge thank you to all our friends in the church community for your love, support and kindness as we prepare ourselves for parenthood, and the many challenges that come with it. I've enjoyed hearing your birth stories, parental experiences in the early days and listening to your advice. I look forward to returning in good organist form (all being well) on Sunday 1st September!



Editorial

I don't think I'm alone when I feel like everything always seems to happen during what is already a busy time. You have a busy week and then if something extra needs to be fitted in, inevitably it will happen during that time too. I have had some car problems recently which has resulted in me needing to rely on others for transport or for me to do a bit more walking. On one occasion I decided to walk the journey. And of course it just so happened to be during a heavy rain 'shower'. There was however the sight of the sunshine beaming ahead of me and this kept me going. I kept looking over my shoulder for the rainbow because I knew there would be one, but sadly on this occasion I didn't spot it.

All of this got me thinking about a few things. Sometimes we have to walk through the storm to find sunnier times. We don't really know what is going on in anyone else's life. But what we do know is that God is the one constant. On Classic FM I heard the presenter say a phrase that stuck with me. I have found the complete saying and it is as follows "My idea is that there is music in the air, music all around us, the world is full of it and you simply take as much as you require." — Edward Elgar, Edward Elgar: Letters of a Lifetime.

My brain then took this further to think about God and his creation. It is all around us, the world is full of it and sometimes we just take in what we need to at the time. The evening after I got soaked I looked out the living room window to see a red squirrel running past. Was this a cheeky reminder from God that he is there and watching and reminding me that everything will be ok? All I know is that God is always there, I don't always speak to him as much I should but I know that when I need him more he will be waiting.

Whatever the summer brings for you - holidays, family time, relaxing, work, a coffee in the garden, nature watching - I hope you take God with you and share the time with Him.


