

MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Celebrating Reformation Day : A Call to Renewed Faith and Hope

This year has been a remarkable one for Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland. After celebrating the 900th anniversary of Forgan Church, a milestone that honoured nine centuries of faith, community, and resilience, we are about to make another piece of history. For the first time, our church will observe Reformation Day on 31st October 2024. The celebration will begin at 2pm in the Church, and it is an event that feels particularly timely as our church—indeed, as our entire denomination—stands at a crossroads.

Reformation Day is observed on 31st October every year and it marks a pivotal event in Christian history: the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. On this day in 1517, Martin Luther, a German monk and theology professor, nailed his Ninety-Five Theses to the door of the Wittenberg Castle church, sparking a movement that challenged the practices and doctrines of the Roman Catholic Church. Luther's act was not merely about theology; it was about the courage to call for reform, justice, and spiritual renewal. It was a moment that redefined the landscape of Christianity, giving rise to Protestant denominations and reshaping the church's mission and its role in society.

As we prepare to commemorate Reformation Day, it is impossible to ignore the context of our present moment. The Church of Scotland is experiencing significant change—marked by doctrinal shifts, structural reconfiguration, and practical challenges like the closure and merging of congregations. This season of transition reflects the broader reality of organised Christianity in the Western world, which faces declining attendance, increasing secularisation, and a shortage of ministers. It is a time that calls us to pause, reflect, and consider how we might faithfully respond to these challenges.

The Reformation, at its core, was driven by the desire for spiritual renewal and a return to the central teachings of Scripture. Reformers like Martin Luther, John Calvin, Ulrich Zwingli, and John Knox sought to ground the church in the foundational principles of the faith, now encapsulated in the "Five Solas": faith alone (*sola fide*), grace alone (*sola gratia*), Scripture alone (*sola scriptura*), Christ alone (*solus Christus*), and to the glory of God alone (*soli Deo gloria*) [Michael Reeves, The Unquenchable Flame: Discovering the Heart of the Reformation (Nashville, TN: B&H Publishing Group, 2010), 45]. These principles are still deeply relevant to us today. They remind us that the authority of our faith rests in God's Word, that salvation is a gift of grace, and that our mission as a church is to glorify God in all that we do.

Reformation Day also celebrates the courage of those who stood up for their convictions, even in the face of great opposition. It invites us to remember that personal faith, freedom of conscience, and the pursuit of truth are worth fighting for. In a time when the future of our church may seem uncertain, we find strength in the words "Ecclesia semper reformanda est"—"the church must always be reforming." This phrase speaks directly to our moment: we are called not to preserve tradition for its own sake, but to allow God to continually reshape and renew us for His purposes.

As we gather to celebrate Reformation Day, let us use this time as an opportunity to reflect on our identity as a community of faith. What does it mean for Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland to choose renewal, to lean into God's promise, and to courageously embrace change? Let us find inspiration in the boldness of the reformers who knew that the essence of church life is not about standing still, but about moving always closer to the truth of the Gospel.

As we celebrate, we remember that God has always been faithful, guiding His people through times of abundance and times of trial. Just as the reformers called the church to return to the core of the Gospel, may we too be emboldened to seek His presence anew in this season. The story of the Reformation tells us that God uses even the most uncertain times to draw His people closer to Him. As we face our own challenges, let us trust that God is still at work, leading us to a future full of promise and transformation.

Let us gather on 31st October, not only to honour the courage of those who have come before us but to celebrate the hope we have in Jesus Christ—the same hope that sparked a reformation and the same hope that sustains us today. "The church must always be reforming." May this become our prayer as we seek to write the next chapter in the story of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland. We look forward to seeing you on Reformation Day!

Christian Aid - Gaza Appeal

Christian Aid is asking churches to hold a collection to send emergency help to the people of Gaza. Christian Aid provides help through trusted partner organisations in Gaza but essential supplies are running low due to the unprecedented situation, and need replenishing.

The destruction in Gaza is on an unimaginable scale.

Nearly 2 million Palestinians have been displaced and are now facing extreme hunger and disease. Civilians have borne the brunt of the violence, including the more than 200 Israeli hostages, at least 100 of whom are still being held in Gaza. More than 40,000 people have been killed, many of whom were children.

To date Christian Aid has raised £2.2 million to help their trusted partners. Although moving around is dangerous these partners have been able to supply aid with food, shelter, medical relief, sanitation, psychological support as well as enabling community-led kitchens. It is estimated that 800,000 people have been supported in this way. But these essential supplies are perilously low and more help is urgently needed. Christian Aid is calling for an immediate and urgent ceasefire but violence is threatening to grow.

Please can you give a donation to provide aid to this shattered area.

Emergency Aid envelopes will be in church to allow us to donate as a church. However, I am aware that many people prefer to simply donate electronically. To do this just Google: Christian Aid Gaza Appeal.


