MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Hope Amidst Change

As the dawn of a new year unfolds, the world remains at a crossroads, marked by profound shifts that evoke hope and apprehension. In the Middle East, a historic peace deal between Palestine and Israel offers a fragile but meaningful glimmer of reconciliation in a region scarred by decades of conflict. Across the Atlantic, the re-election of Donald Trump as President of the United States has rekindled debates about governance, democracy, and national unity. Meanwhile, Syria stands on the precipice of a new chapter, as the regime of President Bashar al-Assad comes to an end, leaving a nation to reckon with its painful past and uncertain future. Closer to home, the United Kingdom faces social and economic challenges, shaping the realities of communities navigating a rapidly evolving landscape. These global transformations, though disparate, speak to a shared human experience – the longing for stability, the search for meaning, and the need for hope amidst uncertainty. The tumult of change often amplifies this yearning, echoing the timeless cry of the disciples on the road to Emmaus: "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over" (Luke 24:29). In their confusion and despair, they sought the companionship of the risen Christ, unaware of the hope already walking alongside them.

This encounter on the road to Emmaus reflects a universal truth: humanity's deep desire for a lasting presence that transcends the fleeting nature of worldly events. The peace deal in the Middle East, however fragile it may be, serves as a reminder that even the most entrenched divisions can begin to heal. The political shifts in the United States and Syria emphasise the importance of just governance and compassionate leadership. In the UK, the challenges of economic change and social reform necessitate resilience, innovation, and a renewed commitment to caring for the vulnerable. Yet, amid these trials, Christians are reminded that true hope is not found in human institutions or earthly resolutions but in the steadfast and unchanging nature of God. The Psalmist captures this eternal truth: "Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and your dominion endures through all generations" (Psalm 145:13). God's constancy serves as a foundation upon which we can build lives of faith, love, and hope, even as the world around us trembles with change. This assurance is not a denial of the challenges we face but a source of strength to meet them with courage and grace.

The timeless hymn *Abide with Me* by Pastor Henry Lyte presents a powerful meditation on this truth. Serving in a small, struggling parish in Devonshire, England, Lyte embodied a faith that chose to "wear out rather than rust out." Written as he approached the end of his life, while battling tuberculosis and asthma, the hymn was inspired by the disciples' plea to Jesus on the road to Emmaus: "*Abide with us*," they urged, "for it is toward evening" (Luke 24:29). Lyte, sensing the nearness of his own "evening", expressed a faith that clung to God's abiding presence even in the shadow of death. Shortly after penning the hymn, he preached his final sermon, crawling to the pulpit in frailty yet unwavering in conviction. His words continue to resonate: "*In life, in death, O Lord, abide with me.*"

In a world marked by change and uncertainty, this hymn reminds us that God remains steadfast in all circumstances. Just as Jesus revealed Himself to the disciples on the road to Emmaus, igniting their hearts with hope, He continues to walk with us today. His promises endure, offering strength to persevere, compassion to extend His love, and courage to stand firm in faith.

As we embark on this new year, let us embrace the hope that arises from the changelessness of God. May we, as Christians, become beacons of this hope, illuminating a world in need. In doing so, we echo the disciples' joyous reflection: "Were not our hearts burning within us while He talked with us on the road?" (Luke 24:32). In life's evenings and uncertainties, may we find solace and strength in the One who abides with us always.

The Guild Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland

Guild Projects 2024-2027

As mentioned previously, the National Guild strategy for the next three years is: 'Let us build a house'. As part of this there are four new 'Guild Projects', which run from 2025 - 2027. Each month we plan to give a bit of information about these projects.

The first one is: Bibles for Bairns, partnering with the Scottish Bible Society who say:

Fewer than half of 0-2-year-olds are read to every day. We want to change that.

Reading to young children helps them to feel safe & loved. It builds self-esteem, grows their vocabulary, and fires their imagination. Reading the Bible can help bring a family together and closer to God.

Our vision is to offer every baby born in Scotland a free Share a Story toddler Bible on their first birthday. Every birthday after that, until age five, we will send a Bible related gift. On their fifth birthday each child will receive an early reader Bible to take them through their primary school years. The Bible gifts are wrapped by volunteers each month and an individual birthday card is written to every child. Before each package is posted we pray over them, knowing that God cares for these children and their families.

This programme costs just £50 per family for the five years and means that from a child's earliest memories and through their school years, the greatest stories from the Bible will play a part in shaping their lives. Our aim is to register up to 1000 babies per year with the cumulative cost per year reaching £50k.'


