This Is the Way: A Gospel That Walks Across Borders

On the weekend of March 29–30, the sanctuary of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland became more than just a place of worship — it became a sacred intersection. The launch of "*Intra-African Pentecostalism and the Dynamics of Power*", the honouring of a Coronation Medal, and a joint service with Scottish and Cameroonian Presbyterians came together not merely as events on a calendar but as a convergence of callings, cultures, and divine grace.

To some, it may have sounded like a whimsical headline: "*A Cameroonian-born minister pastoring a kirk in Fife*." But what unfolded was no anecdote — it was a parable. A living, breathing signpost of a Gospel that refuses to be confined by geography, ethnicity, or history. In a world fragmented by borders and barriers, the Church bore witness to something eternal: a Kingdom without walls.

And as we step into the sacred rhythm of Easter — the season of resurrection, restoration, and reorientation — we are invited to remember that the Gospel still calls out across all our divides:

"This is the way. Walk in it" (Isaiah 30:21).

The prophet Isaiah wrote in a time of national anxiety. God's people, desperate for protection, looked to Egypt — to politics, military alliances, and the illusion of control. Today, the pattern repeats. From the paralysis of Western democracies to the unresolved trauma of the Anglophone crisis in Cameroon, nations still reach for power before prayer, for strategy before surrender.

And yet, into this swirl of misplaced trust, Isaiah speaks a surprising word: "*The Lord longs to be gracious to you… Blessed are all who wait for Him*" (Isaiah 30:18). God is not distant. He is not armed with wrath. He is waiting with mercy. And then comes the promise: "*Whether you turn to the right or the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying: 'This is the way. Walk in it'*" (v.21).

At Easter, we hear that voice most clearly in Christ. In John 6, Jesus declares, "*I am the Bread of Life. Whoever comes to me shall not hunger*." This Bread is not exclusive. It is not reserved for the elite, the insiders, or the doctrinally pristine. It is for whoever — for the hungry, the searching, the wandering, the weary.

And that, dear friends, is what we experienced that weekend — not just a celebration of a book or a medal, but of a *borderless Gospel*. A Cameroonian pastor in a Scottish pulpit is not a footnote of migration — it is a manifestation of divine imagination. This is the Church as she was meant to be: multicultural, multilingual, multi-storied — yet unified in Christ.

In a time of global instability — the war in Gaza and Ukraine, climate anxiety, refugee displacement, and deepening economic hardship — we need more than human solutions. We need holy imagination. We need a Church that does not build higher walls but longer tables. A Church that remembers. There are no passports at Christ's Table. No checkpoints. Just grace.

So, this Easter, let us walk this way:

With courage in the face of fear.

- With mercy, amid injustice.

- With hope, even when the night is long.

Because the Bread has been broken. The Voice is speaking. This is the way. Walk in it. And by God's grace — we will.

But even the most faithful hearts know what it feels like to fear the future.

In 1969, in the shadow of civil unrest, assassinations, and the Vietnam War, Bill and Gloria Gaither were expecting their third child. The world around them felt unstable — politically, socially, and spiritually. They feared for the future their baby would inherit.

But it was in that place of fear that faith rose.

One day, as they looked into the face of their newborn son, a quiet assurance stirred in their hearts. Life was still worth living — not because the world had changed, but because Christ lives. From that assurance came the hymn we now sing with generations of believers:

"Because He lives, I can face tomorrow; Because He lives, all fear is gone; Because I know, I know He holds the future, And life is worth the living just because He lives."

This is our Easter anthem. This is the reason we walk on.

Not because we are strong, but because *He is risen*. Not because the world is easy, but because *the way is grace*. And because He lives — so shall we.



During April we will be supporting St Salvador's.


There continues to be a great response to this appeal and as the cost of living is still high (especially over colder months) the need of some people may well be greater, so please consider supporting this if you can.

Guild Projects 2025-2027

As we mentioned in the last couple of Journals, the National Guild strategy for the next three years is 'Let us build a house'. There are four new 'Guild Projects', which run from 2025 - 2027.

Each month we have been giving information about each of these projects. In the February Journal we highlighted **Bibles for Bairns**, partnering with the Scottish Bible Society. In March it was '**Build My Church**'. This month we highlight '**Operation Hope**'.

Operation Hope is a project of Release International – the Voice of Persecuted Christians.

Egypt is home to the largest Christian minority in the Middle East with around 10-12% of the population professing faith in Jesus. However, as a minority they face varying levels of discrimination and suffer poverty and lack of education, especially in the more rural areas of Upper Egypt. In local disputes with their neighbours, Christians are often blamed regardless of fault and in some cases have been forced to leave their homes.

Working with a local partner, Release International's Operation Hope project serves Christian communities in Upper Egypt helping those who are facing extreme poverty and marginalisation. Families are provided with basic living needs such as beds, toilet facilities, kitchen appliances, food, and funds to help with the construction of their homes. The project also helps families establish micro-businesses so they can begin to support themselves, and it provides psychological and spiritual care through regular visits and discipleship programmes.

The Operation Hope project aims to support 2,000 people in around 100 villages in Upper Egypt each year. Through the Guild's generous support multiple practical needs will be met; poverty will be alleviated; the impact of persecution and marginalisation will be reduced; Christian families will be assured of their value and given opportunities to build a future; and ultimately the wider Christian community in Upper Egypt will be established, strengthened, and enabled to flourish.
