MINISTER'S MESSAGE

"To Be Free Is Not Merely to Cast Off One's Chains"

Scripture Test : Micah 6:8 "He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God."

After Easter, Florence and I travelled to South Africa for the first time to celebrate the golden jubilee of my elder sister, Dr. Mrs. Patience Akih. It was a joyous reunion, but also a deeply reflective journey. During our time there, we visited some of the most significant sites tied to the country's painful past and its struggle for justice.

On Monday 28th April we visited Soweto. We walked through the streets that shaped the lives of two towering moral figures: Nelson Mandela and Archbishop Desmond Tutu. We toured Mandela House at 8115 Orlando West, where Nelson Mandela lived after his release from prison. The house, now a museum, is more than just bricks and mortar - it is a living testimony of resilience and faith under fire. On its walls are inscribed words that cut through time and politics. One quote in particular struck me: "To be free is not merely to cast off one's chains, but to live in a way that respects and enhances the freedom of others" (Nelson Mandela). This is not just political philosophy. It echoes the deep moral responsibility that Micah speaks of, "to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with God". Mandela's life, like that of many prophets and reformers, stands as a reminder that true freedom involves lifting others, not just securing comfort for ourselves. Though we were unable to enter the Tutu residence, now occupied by his family and grandchildren, the presence of these homes in a single neighbourhood speaks volumes. It is as though Soweto itself preached a sermon that day: a call to justice, memory, and moral courage.

On Tuesday 29th April, which happened to be my birthday, we visited the Union Buildings, the seat of South Africa's presidency. That moment alone was meaningful, but the day after became even more memorable later that evening, when my sister and her husband, Rev. Dr. Akih Abraham, hosted a celebration in my honour. Rev. Dr. Abraham, who pioneered the Presbyterian Church in Cameroon (PCC) in South Africa, continues to serve its congregations across Pretoria, Johannesburg, and Cape Town. Being surrounded by family, members and leaders of the Presbyterian Church in Cameroon in South Africa, and the legacy of freedom fighters, reminded me that our Christian witness must stretch beyond worship on Sundays. It must echo in public life.

Back home in Scotland and the West, the challenges may look different, by they are no less real. We face rising political polarisation, indifference to the suffering of others, and the temptation to privatise our faith. But the gospel does not permit such detachment. The Church is called to be salt and light, not in abstraction, but in the real grit of public life. What struck me most about Mandela's quote is its relevance to our context. Freedom here is often framed as personal choice or independence. But biblical freedom, and Mandela's kind, is always relational. It demands we ask: Who is being left out? Whose dignity is being trampled? As Christians, if we are truly walking humbly with our God, then we must also walk publicly with the oppressed, the voiceless, the marginalised. The Western Church today must recover its prophetic voice. Like Mandela and Tutu in their time, we must speak against structures that degrade human life, whether it is poverty, racism, unchecked capitalism, or the exploitation of the earth. Not with anger alone, but with hope and conviction.

Mandela endured 27 years in prison, yet emerged without bitterness, choosing reconciliation over revenge. This represents a kind of freedom rooted not in ideology but in deep moral courage, and for us, grounded in the cross of Christ. If we do not act justly, our worship becomes hollow. If we do not love mercy, our theology becomes noise. South Africa taught me that justice is costly, but silence is costlier. My prayer for our church is that we would have the courage not only to remember the past but also to live in the future, a future where justice is not merely an idea but a way of life. As Mandela put it, freedom is not just casting off chains. It is building a world where everyone can breathe.



All my hope on God is founded

I was fortunate enough to participate in our Sunday morning worship service on 27th April (for those who may have missed it you can listen to it here http://www.notchurch.co.uk/files/2517/4578/6865/Sunday Service 27-04-2025.mp3).

There were two key themes that ran throughout the service. We heard from our Prayer Development Team about their work and the **trypraying** initiative. This included two members of our church family sharing their experience of what prayer means to them. This theme was picked up and developed alongside the gospel reading from John 20 where Philip encouraged us to reflect on how we can counter doubts in faith.

The content of the service and the testimonies that were given prompted me to ask myself what prayer means to me and how do I challenge my doubts when my faith is shaken. In thinking this through, alongside the comments made by the two Catherine's during the service, a light bulb moment occurred.

In November 2019 my Mum unfortunately passed away suddenly without warning. This was a massive shock to the family as it was so unexpected. At the time I kept questioning why God let this happen. Roll forward a month and news was beginning to break of a pandemic spreading across the globe. I'm sure that we can all remember the need for social distancing, wearing of masks, and in some cases shielding. Due to my own health this involved being admitted to a specialist hospital in Edinburgh for over a month with no family visits.



As my Mum had passed away unexpectantly an inquest was needed. However, due to the lockdown rules the coroners office took months to issue the report. When we finally received the report we discovered that my Mum had a number of underlying, undiagnosed health conditions.

Looking at the timeline of events I could see that my faith at the time was significantly challenged and I found myself doubting. However, on receiving the inquest report I was able to reconcile that God had seen something that I hadn't and the circumstances around my Mum's passing happened for a reason too.

John 3 v 16 'For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life' illustrates that our prayers are not always answered in the way or at the time we would expect.


Philip's comments during the sermon about countering doubt with certainty ring true, as do the words in Hymn 192: 'All my hope on God is founded,

Prayer for me is being able to speak to God, safe in the knowledge that someone is listening who will not judge me or try to fix the problem, but will provide unconditional love.

Guild Projects 2025-2027

As we mentioned in the last few Journals, the National Guild strategy for the next three years is `Let us build a house'. There are four new `Guild Projects', which run from 2025 - 2027.

Each month we have been giving information about each of these projects. In the February Journal we highlighted 'Bibles for Bairns', partnering with the Scottish Bible Society. In March it was 'Build My Church'. In April it was 'Operation Hope'.

This month we highlight 'Let's build a house' a life enhancing and life saving partnership between the Guild and CrossReach.

Working together for these three years, let's build a house lays a strong foundation for vulnerable families. Together we will support families at Sunflower Garden in Edinburgh and Daisy Chain in Glasgow. A child's early years can have an impact that lasts a lifetime. The Guild's support will ensure infants have the best possible start in life by developing strong positive relationships between parents and children. With the ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the cost-of living crisis, parents are presenting to us with more trauma and distress than at any other time. Demand, and the need for your help, is greater than ever.

Research shows that parents who attend to their own emotional and psychological needs are in a better position to respond to their infant's cues and engage with them in positive ways. The Guild will support specialist perinatal therapy with crèche support at Sunflower Garden. The team there delivers Parent and Infant Relationship therapy. Parents can access their counselling sessions while leaving their baby in trusted hands.

Daisy Chain is a community based, inclusive, early intervention project for children under 12 and their families. With your support, the team will work to improve children's health and wellbeing through play and nurture. Your help will strengthen family relationships and support families to become more resilient. Children with disabilities, from deprived backgrounds and facing home challenges can thrive here.

Digital Detoxing and Doomscrolling

One of the many joys of being at church on a Sunday is being able to switch off - from the digital world. I love nothing more than a 'digital detox'. Why? I feel the Internet is an insidious black vortex that adds a lot of unnecessary stress to daily life. Social media, fake news, doomscrolling*, the list goes on. Sometimes I'm tempted to throw my phone in the Tay but I talk myself out of it by saying, 'I need it'.

I asked why I need it and the response comes back round to 'what if someone needs to contact me', 'emergency, eek!', 'what if I miss something', etc. And then I contemplated this: a true and genuine connection comes from real relationships, not 'likes' or watching influencers.

And, how often are we interrupted by our smartphones day to day? I suspect the answer is more often than we think.

This is in no way a call for you to throw away your smartphone as it is a lifeline for some. Instead, I invite you to evaluate your dependency on it and to remember, if you were born early enough, what life was like before all this. There was certainly nothing bad about it: we survived using landlines, bulky computers with funny dial up tones and using cassettes to listen to music.

When my daughter was born, I hastily threw my phone in a drawer and left it there for nearly a month. It was glorious. I didn't have a clue what was happening in the world and I finally had the peace and stillness I was longing for. Since then, I've practised putting it away for longer periods during the day, signing out of social media accounts now and then, and stopped spending long periods doomscrolling when I could be doing something more meaningful.

My digital detox has been a positive experience and I recommend it for the purpose of your wellbeing and focusing on real human connections. If you need time, space and stillness, do consider it, even if it's for one day.
