MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Journal

Holding Steady in Times of Change

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8).

As autumn colours our fields and the Tay glistens under a softer sun, we find ourselves once again in a season of transition, both in nature and in the life of the Church. Across Fife Presbytery, congregations are discerning new futures together. The recent votes by Balmerino & Wormit and Creich, Flisk & Kilmany to form a union, with the intention of subsequently joining with Newport-on-Tay, marks a new chapter in our shared story of faith. Change is rarely easy, yet it is often the place where God's grace does its quietest and deepest work. In this reflection, I will explore four areas of life that reveal the spirit of change in the Church, in our personal faith, in the world around us, and in the enduring presence of Christ who remains our anchor through it all.

1. Communion in a Changing Church

On Sunday 26th October, we gathered around the Lord's Table for our October Holy Communion. What a fitting time for this sacrament, a reminder that while our church structures may change, Christ's invitation remains constant. The bread may come from different ovens, the cup may be shared in different sanctuaries, but the meaning remains the same: Christ still invites. Christ still feeds. Christ still unites. Long before there was a Church of Scotland, there was a table in an upper room. Around it sat anxious disciples, sensing their world was about to be turned upside down. It was there that Jesus took the bread, broke it, and said, "Do this in remembrance of me." Through that simple act, he gave his followers a rhythm of grace strong enough to carry the Church through centuries of change. When we share Communion, we are reminded that the future of the Church is not solely in our hands; it rests in the faithfulness of the One who calls us to the table, again and again.

2. Is the Church Dying or Being Reborn?

Many have asked, sometimes with heavy hearts, "Is the Church dying?" Congregations are merging, buildings are closing, and attendance is not what it once was. But perhaps what we are witnessing is not death but pruning — the necessary cutting back that allows new life to emerge. Jesus said, "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (John 12:24). Renewal always involves loss, but loss is never the final word in God's story. In the Presbytery of Fife, these structural changes may challenge us, but they also open doors for cooperation, shared witness, and fresh expressions of community. Perhaps this is how God is calling us back from the comfort of maintenance to the adventure of mission.

3. The World Beyond Our Shores

Change is not just something the Church wrestles with, it is the rhythm of the world we live in. In my home country of Cameroon, presidential elections were held on 12th October 2025. At 92 years old, Paul Biya, who has ruled since 1982, was once again declared the winner. If he serves another full term of 7 years, as the constitution allows, he would have led the country for 50 years and would be 99, nearly 100 years old. How can a nation emerge into its future when its present is locked in the grip of the past? No wonder so many in the Cameroonian diaspora are also crying out for change. But you can't kill a snake with a long stick.

This hunger for transformation isn't unique to Cameroon. From the ruins of Gaza to the resistance in Ukraine, from frustrated streets to quiet corners of our own communities, the world groans for justice, peace, and renewal. And yet—still—the Church gathers. Still, we break bread. Still, we pray. In doing so, we bear witness to a different kingdom, one not built on control or fear, but on love. Every small act of compassion, every table shared, every voice lifted in prayer declares this truth: Christ's kingdom is already among us.

4. Holding Steady in Christ

So, what does it mean to hold steady in times of change? It means anchoring our hearts not in buildings or traditions, but in Christ himself — the One who holds all things together. It means trusting that the God who has guided us thus far will not abandon us now. As we move forward into this new season of partnership and shared ministry, may we do so with open hands and steady hearts. Let us remember that the Church does not belong to us; it belongs to the Lord who called it into being. The world will keep changing. Governments will rise and fall. Congregations will merge and adapt. But the love that drew us to the Table will never fade. In every age, in every transition, Christ stands at the centre, whispering the same invitation: "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest".

May that promise steady us for the days ahead, and may the peace of Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever, guard our hearts and guide our steps.

Joint Service


Our final Joint Service for 2025 will take place in our Church on **Sunday 16th November at 10:15am**. Please note the earlier start time.

Thoughts for Autumn



Autumn is my favourite season. I marvel at the richness of the colours of the trees and am transported back to my childhood.

It was as I was walking through Tayfield Estate, (kicking up the leaves, searching for conkers and looking for Squirrel Nutkin and Mrs Tiggywinkle like my five-year-old self), that I began to think of the similarity of the trees to our church family.

The trees in all their different varieties and stages of growth create the splendour of the forest. I value trees as a blessing from God.

Just like the trees we are a diverse, unique and colourful congregation. Each in a different season of our lives. Individually and collectively, we are a living image of God's gift to both us and the world.

Review of Church Roll

As mentioned in the October Journal, our Church keeps a roll of its members, who have joined by profession of faith, or by transfer of certificate, or by resolution of the Kirk Session; and also of adherents who, although not members, regularly attend worship.

We are required to review our rolls annually to ensure that they accurately record those who are taking part in the worship, mission, and service of the church. However, we continue to retain those who are unable to attend worship through ill-health or infirmity. But it is equally worthwhile for each of us to reflect on our own commitment to the work of Christ's church through our dedication of time, talents, and money, and also through the bonds that hold the family of God together. If you are not yet a member and would consider becoming one, please speak to the Minister or your Elder, and we can discuss the next steps.

The process of reviewing the roll also involves removing the names of those we have lost contact with over the years. Members have full voting rights on congregational matters, whereas adherents can only vote on certain matters. As the church reflects on and discusses the Union of the churches in our corner of Fife, it is important that those who are the living stones come together in the name of the Lord God, whom the writer of Hebrews calls "the builder of everything".

So please make this time of review a time also to review your relationship to the church, and if you would consider membership, please get in touch.



- When your hands are together in a praying position, the closest finger to you is the thumb. Since it is the closest to you, the thumb reminds you to pray for those that are closest to you. Pray for your family and friends.
- The next finger is called your index finger; it is used for pointing. Let this finger remind you to pray for those that point you in the right direction. Pray for your teachers at school, your Sunday Club teachers, and the minister.
- The next finger is the tallest finger. This finger reminds us to pray for our leaders. Pray for the King, leaders in our government and those who are leaders in our local community.
- The fourth finger is the called the ring finger. Did you know that this is the weakest of all the fingers? Just ask anyone who plays the piano and they will tell you that is true. Let this finger remind you to pray for those who are sick or who need a helping hand.
- The last finger is the smallest finger. The Bible says, "Do not think of yourself more highly than you ought." Let the little finger remind you to pray for yourself.

We have so much in our lives to be thankful of and sometimes we overlook the little things. As we start

to approach the end of the year, I would like to encourage you to stop and appreciate the small things in life. Pray about them, thank God for them, and make prayer a regular part of your day, because lots of little things combine to become something bigger, much bigger than we can ever imagine.

We give thank to God for manna and all the blessings it gives to our community. God bless



On the big day Alison, Andrea and I greeted Diane in the morning with a rendition of Happy Birthday.



Autumn Reflections

My favourite season is Autumn. I love watching the leaves turn colour from bright green to a mixture of golds, browns and oranges, and watching them fly away in the wind. The temperature drops, but I enjoy wearing my cosy jumpers, sipping a warm drink, and curling up on the sofa with a wool blanket. If it rains heavily outside, I don't mind.

There is something about Autumn that invites us to stop in our tracks: the year is gradually drawing to a close, and in turn, encourages us to reflect on the past year, and nature itself also reminds us of change. The trees shed their leaves, rest for the winter, and the growth begins again in Spring.

Most recently, I have reflected on healing, in many forms. In my last article, I briefly discussed the topic of grief and the comforts in aiding the healing journey. However, I realise that it is not always a quick or straightforward process. Just like the trees, we sometimes go through seasons of shedding: letting go of what is no longer needed, even when it is painful to do so. Healing often requires rest, patience, and trusting that, eventually, new growth will come.

Some of you may have noticed that I haven't been on the organ bench for a while, owing to an injury to my finger. I tried everything for it to heal: ibuprofen gel, warm baths, splinting, holistic medicines, even witch doctor stuff. Finally, after ten months, the GP said 'We can't do anything for you. I'm afraid the only option is to rest'.

At first, I found this incredibly frustrating. Rest felt like doing nothing - like giving up. I wanted to play, and to carry on doing what I feel is quite natural. But as the days are shorter and the evenings darker and colder, I realised that perhaps this is a lesson in stillness. Healing, whether physical or emotional, can't be rushed. I don't need to look far: I gave birth last year!


This is now week four of resting. If I'm being honest, I haven't seen much improvement in my finger, other than it doesn't click as violently as it used to. It seems ridiculous that something as small as an injury to a finger has become a big problem: if I had a broken ankle, or even a broken leg, that is certainly less of a problem when it comes to organ playing.

A lot of scenarios played on my mind earlier in the year: is my performance career over? Will it ever heal? Do I need surgery? Catastrophizing is pointless. Although the situation is testing my patience, the solution is simple: if you rest, it will heal.

I would like to thank Eleanor Owen and Lewis Thomson for covering while my finger recovers. It's always a joy to hear them play and we're incredibly lucky to have them with us.

Thank you for your support too, especially your kind comments about the Joint Service on 5th October.
