for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland for the year ended 31 December 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 12 & 13 of these accounts and comply with the General Assembly Regulations for Congregational Finance, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

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Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in polity. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call and duty to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland through a territorial ministry. It co-operates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Our Vision is "To be a Church which inspires people with the Good News of Jesus Christ through our enthusiasm, worship, witness, nurture and service".

Objectives and Activities (cont.)

In Newport-on-Tay, services of worship are held at 11a.m. every Sunday and more frequently at times of special celebration (e.g. Easter, Christmas). Our evening services, at 6.30pm, are less formal, last approx. 30 minutes and vary each week from a traditional to a more contemporary styled approach, with a monthly Round the Table Communion Service. Worship is normally conducted by the Minister, while, in addition, lay members of the Church's Worship Team (all of whom have undertaken the Presbytery's "Weaving Worship" training programme) lead some of the services. There is weekly involvement of the congregation's members with readings and, from time to time, prayers and other elements of the service. The singing is led by the organist and choir, while some of the Church youth (also under the guidance of our organist) help to lead more contemporary music. In September this year, Garry Fraser, our organist and choirmaster for the last twenty years, retired; a successful recruitment campaign saw Hannah Gibson, a Masters graduate from the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire and accomplished organist, appointed to the post of Church organist and choirmaster.

After morning worship, tea / coffee is served in the main hall to provide a continuing opportunity for fellowship. During the service, there is a crèche for those under three years old, while in term time there is an active Sunday Club for children aged three to eleven, supplemented by 'Funday Sundays' during holidays to provide continuity of interest for the children and Godly Play (an approach to Christian Education based on the Montessori principles) conducted four times a year. A full-time youth worker leads Youth Seekers (for those of secondary school age), but while absent during a lengthy personal medical investigation, this role was undertaken by members of the Youth Team. He returned to work in the autumn and is steadily establishing connections with the youth both here in Newport and in the surrounding area. A Holiday Club is run during the final week of the school summer holidays for primary school age children. The 1st Newport / Wormit Boys' Brigade Company is attached to this Church and also to the neighbouring Wormit Parish Church.

On the wider front there are ecumenical services shared with the Roman Catholic, Scottish Episcopal and Wormit Parish Churches (such as Good Friday Service, World Day of Prayer Service, etc.) and a number of shared ventures - e.g. the Remembrance Sunday Service at the War Memorial (co-ordinated by the Community Council) - are well supported. We continue to display a number of soldier silhouettes within the pews as part of the national "There But Not There" initiative in November. Alongside this there are a number of scheduled services in the local care homes, as well as a continuing presence of the Minister and/or youth worker in the local Primary School via assemblies and end of term services.

St Andrews Presbytery is divided into six 'Clusters', with our congregation being part of the North Fife Cluster, together with Balmerino linked with Wormit, Creich, Flisk & Kilmany, Leuchars St Athernase and Tayport. This year has seen the continuation of the Cluster Exchange Sundays with ministers swapping pulpits on a rotational basis. In addition, Presbytery's Strategy & Resourcing Committee has identified a number of specific objectives to be pursued within our own Parish and has also encouraged the Cluster to look at ways of working together and supporting each other. An example of this has arisen following the retirement of Rev Brian Oxburgh, following which Tayport Parish Church has been sisted into 'Guardianship' necessitating additional "fraternal" support from our Minister, Worship Team and the provision of an Assessor Elder.

Our Prayer Ministry Group plays a leading part in the prayer life of the Church and meets each Sunday prior to morning worship and there is a box available for prayer requests in the Church and in our café, manna. A weekly Bible Study Group is also popular with its enthusiastic attendees.

Our Pastoral Care Team continues to visit and care for the members of our Church and others who are part of the wider community, including hospital and home visits where appropriate. There is also a programme of funeral and hospital follow-up visits and regular contact with the care homes in the parish. The weekly distribution of flowers following the Sunday morning services continues to be of significant comfort to many in our community. In addition, an appropriate card is delivered to those who have attained a significant birthday, anniversary, etc.

A number of House Groups operate on differing days and times, ensuring availability to suit all who wish to attend. Each group determines their own bible study and discussion programme, overseen by the Minister.

Achievements and Performance

With his family having settled into life in Newport following his induction as our Minister in May 2017, Rev Dr Amos B Chewachong has built on his wealth of experience and ministry from his homeland of Cameroon and from his years of studying and his ministry in Edinburgh.

During the year under review our work in the local community and beyond has continued. This has been achieved by diligent ministry of the fundamentals of the Christian faith at our regular Sunday services of worship as supplemented by the work of our Prayer and House Groups and, for the younger members, the meetings of our Sunday Club and Youth Seekers.

Our Property Manager and his team have continued to pursue a programme of repair and maintenance, attending to identified needs within the Church, hall, Kirk House Complex and its surrounding grounds and the manse. Within the Church building, this year has witnessed the refurbishment and re-carpeting of the vestry, toilet, choir room and associated staircase.

manna, our café & gift shop, founded in March 2006, continues by way of volunteer workers to provide a worthwhile focal point for the community and provides an opportunity to demonstrate Christian values in action to a wider audience. The net proceeds continue to finance the employment of the full-time Youth Worker, which remains at the forefront of our efforts to engage with the youth in our community. manna is a member of the Newport-on-Tay Traders Association and was again involved in their various activities during the year, especially, the mid-summer festival and surrounding the switching-on of the local Christmas lights. In 2018 Newport High Street won the 'Rising Star' category in the Great British High Street Awards.

We are also engaged with the local Tay Bridgehead Food Bank, with manna being a collection point for donations; in addition, donations of food were coordinated by our Sunday Club during Lent and the Harvest Thanksgiving Service. We also support a Food Cupboard Ministry at St Salvador's Church in Dundee, which deals specifically with a struggling section of their community; our Harvest Appeal offerings were shared between this project and a 'Safe House' project in the Nankumba and Madziabango area of Southern Malawi.

The Kirk House Complex of halls, meeting rooms, etc., is well used by Church organisations and by the local community – including children's parties and organisations such as Brownies, Probus Club, dancing, keep fit classes, a Mother & Toddlers Group, etc. As such, it provides a valuable community asset in terms of a large central suite of halls that can be used at low cost by a wide range of groups and organisations. During the recent refurbishment of the neighbouring Blyth Hall, further groups have sought to use the hall.

Communication between our congregation and the wider community remains effective by means of our Journal, website and Facebook page.

Our Sunday Club continues to support Rimberto, a young boy in Bolivia, through the offices of World Vision and this, along with our support of national charities such as Christian Aid, augment more local efforts via the two food banks mentioned above.

In December 2017, our Malawi Gwengwere Project was brought to a close with the residual funds (£4,161) paid to Mary's Meals to support their children's feeding programme in Malawi; this donation was match-funded by other supporters of Mary's Meals. Our overseas mission focus has now turned to supporting initiatives in Cameroon. Fundraising has continued with a Scottish themed Cluster 'Songs of Praise' in January 2020 raising £590. The identification of suitable projects/programmes to sponsor is still at an early stage.

In conjunction with all other organisations, large and small, we have examined the requirements of GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations); one of our Kirk Session members is undertaking the task of implementing the necessary procedures and policies.

Financial Review

The total Net Income for the year was £31,921, compared to net income of £1,433 in 2018. Major reasons for the change were the receipt late in the year of a legacy of £50,000 and a net gain on the revaluation of our investments (£16,635) (2018 : loss -£9,651); this was partly offset by increased costs of having a youth worker for a full year in 2019 (£17,673) and a complete refurbishment of the kitchen area in manna (£14,417).

The balances carried forward on the General Fund (after allowing for this Fund's proportion of investment revaluation) were £41,022 (Capital) and £51,212 (Revenue).

Income

Income from our Offerings (including Gift Aid recovered) in 2019 was $\pounds 61,879$ (2018 : $\pounds 60,416$) an increase of 2.4% ($\pounds 1,463$) on 2018. This reflects an excellent result, despite the current economic pressures on households and the loss of a small number of generous regular donors.

56 (a decrease of 6) out of a membership of 323 actively use the Gift Aid scheme and 25 of these contribute by means of a standing order through their bank.

Other Donations totalled £5,759, a decrease of £307. Members also contributed £4,320 to other charitable causes during the year (2018 : £5,086); these figures include our Harvest Appeal, which raised £1,570 and was split between the Food Cupboard Ministry of St Salvador's Church Dundee and a Malawi Safe House Project. Other significant income related to sundry donations (£4,050) and donations from Sunday & Wednesday Coffees (£500). In addition, a legacy of £50,000 from a member was received late this year; the Kirk Session has yet to decide how to make the most appropriate use of this generous gift.

Income from the use of our hall complex rose by £1,948, due to a general increase in usage of the premises by regular users and also by other groups who have been displaced during the refurbishment of the Blyth Hall. Meanwhile, the gross income from our shops fell by £2,090 due to a temporary vacancy at 19 Cupar Road. The trading income from manna showed a decrease of £7,987 (9.9%) to £73,059; this income is comparable to years prior to 2019, though a contributing factor was income lost during a two-week closure in July 2019 to completely refurbish the kitchen area.

The (Restricted) Youth Work Fund decreased by £5,240 as the monthly contribution into this fund from manna (also a Restricted Fund) did not cover the expenditure incurred.

Expenditure

Total Expenditure in 2019 was £202,148, an increase of £45,209 (28.8%) on 2018. Significant changes were an increase in our Ministries & Mission Allocation for this year of £4,808, increased expenditure on salaries (£16,811) chiefly due to the Youth Worker post being filled for a full year, higher expenditure on fabric repairs & maintenance (£4,825) – see below. In addition, manna expenditure increased by £14,585, almost entirely resulting from the kitchen area refurbishment (£14,417).

In recent years our Property Manager has adopted a proactive role regarding the maintenance and condition of our properties. A major review was undertaken and a five-year programme of maintenance was drawn up; this will incur a significant level of expenditure over that period and additional sources of funding are being pursued and some saving is being made by volunteer work. The repair and maintenance of our properties in 2019 cost £14,432, which was initially charged to the Fabric Fund and was partially compensated by the receipt of £3,688 from an insurance claim. These costs included completion of the decoration and refurbishment of the Church's vestry, choir room, toilet and corridor (£4,561), repair of one of the windows in the Church's south transept (£3,001), Church heating repairs (£1,817), stonework repairs at Blyth Street (£1,440) and manse roof repairs (£821), while a start was made to the maintenance and repainting within the Kirk House Complex (£1,000).

While the Fabric Revenue Fund showed a deficit at 31 December 2019, appropriate funds are still held for us by the General Trustees which will be transferred during 2020 to cover significant expenditure incurred.

Investment Policy and Performance

Recognising the lack of expertise within the trustees to manage the Church's portfolio of investments (currently approx. £134,000), it was decided some years ago to transfer this responsibility to Barclays Wealth (with an appropriate fee payable). Our investments are currently held as a "Discretionary Account" with a "Balanced Portfolio" prime investment objective and a "Moderate Risk Tolerance".

Following their recommendation, the individual shareholdings were converted into units in Barclays Charity Fund; this provides the benefits of belonging to a large fund (with its spread of investments and risk, together with a lower management fee). The Fund was established in 2013 and its performance and income received are in line with current market trends and results, while income is similar to last year.

Risk Management

The trustees recognise the risks inherent in resourcing and delivering a challenging programme of worship and mission in an era of increasing financial constraints and membership which is ageing and reducing in number. They have assessed the major risks to which we are exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Church. They are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks. Risk and control activities include Safeguarding policy, GDPR policy, financial control procedures, and regular reporting by all committees. We are insured through the Church of Scotland Insurance Company and the level of cover is reviewed annually to ensure that it is adequate.

A major impending risk is the significant projected reduction in the number of Church of Scotland ministers; the impact of this is that North Fife Cluster has been allocated a total of two full-time ministers for the foreseeable future. There are growing concerns regarding the future workload of ministers (such as ours) currently in a charge who will have to provide support for other charges. This will have a noticeable effect as, until recently, our Cluster had four ministers and by late 2021 this will likely have fallen to one (ours!). Hopefully one more will be forthcoming but the shortfall will require quite drastic action and support, including a greatly increased involvement of congregational members in all aspects of the life and work of their (and neighbouring) churches. These matters are currently receiving much thought and discussion both at Presbytery and at national level.

A less common risk is that of food hygiene, which is addressed by the manna manager ensuring that appropriate training is given to key staff and volunteers (whether serving in the café, baking, or otherwise preparing or handling food, etc.).

Reserves Policy

The charity trustees have considered the reserves required and have taken into account their current and future liabilities. It is the trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months expenditure excluding endowment, restricted and designated funds. At the year-end the Church held unrestricted funds of £230,605 of which £60,000 was the Building Valuation Fund and £78,371 had been designated for Fabric Fund, Choir & Organ Fund, etc. Within the balance held in the General Fund (£92,234) is the recently-received legacy of £50,000, while the remaining £42,234 represented approx. 6.07 months' General Fund expenditure.

The Church also held £58,821 in restricted funds and £20,973 in Endowment Funds, which have been provided for the purposes specified in Note 15.

Structure, Governance and Management

The congregation is a registered Scottish charity, number SC006758; it is administered in accordance with the terms of the Deed of Constitution (Unitary Form) and is subject to the Acts and Regulations of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. On 24 June 2018 the congregation agreed to adopt the Unitary Constitution and the Kirk Session produced a set of guidelines for the operation of the constitution, identifying a number of committees, which are capable of having members who are not elders; these committees will be closely monitored by Session, and will have various powers delegated to them. The process of developing these committees is currently under way and this moved forward significantly following the ordination/induction of 11 new elders in February 2019. Meetings of Session are scheduled on a monthly basis (excluding the summer months), with committees, which are free to meet as required during the year, reporting to Session on a rotational basis.

The Kirk Session members are the elders of the Church and are chosen from those members of the Church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts, Christian maturity and skills. The Minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by St. Andrews Presbytery; in the absence of a minister, St Andrews Presbytery appoint an interim moderator to take his/her place.

I report on the accounts of Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland for the year ended 31 December 2019 which are set out on pages 9 to 21.

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity's trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.

Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and preceding year in dealing with items that are considered to be material to the accounts, are set out below.

Basis of Preparation

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice ('Charities SORP') applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

Fund Accounting

Funds are classified as either restricted funds or unrestricted funds, defined as follows:

<u>Restricted funds</u> are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the charity. <u>{Endowment funds</u> are restricted funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income there from is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.} <u>Unrestricted funds</u> are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are <u>designated</u> as a separate fund. This designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Incoming Resources

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donated Services and Facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) the general volunteer time of congregational members is not recognised. On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt.

Interest Receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable.

Fixed Assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the Church, Kirk House Complex, Manse (17 East Station Place) and house (12 Kerr Street), all vested in the Church of Scotland General Trustees. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Ownership of four shops (two currently occupied by manna) in Cupar Road (nos. 11, 13, 17, 19) is vested locally.

Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of all these assets (excluding the four shops) is charged to the Fabric Fund as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

Expenditure incurred on the maintenance and management of the four shop properties is charged to the General Fund and recorded in the statement of financial activities in the period in which the liability arises.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £5,000 and having a value to the charity greater than one year, other than those acquired for specific purposes, are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives; depreciation is charged in the year of acquisition but not in the year of disposal. The only such assets held by the charity are the above freehold properties (Cupar Road shops), which are depreciated over 20 years.

Accounting Policies (cont.)

Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date.

<u>Unrealised gains and losses</u> represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year or (if purchased in the year) the difference between the cost and the market value at the end of the year. <u>Realised gains and losses</u> represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or the cost if purchased in the year.

Taxation

Newport-on-Tay Church of Scotland is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation legislation and is therefore not subject to taxation on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

Purposes of Endowment Funds

Income from the Mission and Aid Bequests is to be used to help meet the Ministries and Mission Allocation. Income received is transferred to the General Fund annually.

Purposes of Restricted Funds

manna : café whose proceeds contribute significantly towards the costs of employing our youth worker.

Youth Work : income regularly transferred from manna to finance the costs of our youth worker.

Newport Church / Cameroon Project : this will finance one or more projects (still to be identified) in Cameroon to support the welfare there, especially with regard to children and their education.

Purposes of Unrestricted Funds (set aside by the trustees)

Building Valuation Fund : to record the estimated value of locally-held property (shop units at 11 - 19 Cupar Road).

Benevolent Fund : to provide sundry cash payments and appropriate gifts to those in need. Choir & Organ Fund: to finance the maintenance of the organ and the acquisition of music and other musical instruments.

Fabric Fund : for the maintenance of the Church's properties.

Journal Fund : to assist with the costs of producing the charity's magazine (nine times per year).

Parish Development Fund : to finance projects to promote the charity, especially within the local parish and community.

Sunday School Fund : to assist with the costs of running the Sunday School.

Church Groups / Organisations

Stewardship Committee : principally funded by Wednesday and Sunday serving of teas & coffees; income used for variety of purposes within this charity.

Sunday School Collections : offerings distributed to support a child in Bolivia through World Vision. Due to the recent deficit on this Fund, a transfer was made from the General Fund to clear this balance at 31 December 2018.

Gardening Club : net income from members, currently held by the charity while club is in abeyance, and is being spent on specific acquisitions for the Church/Kirk House Complex grounds.

- * Alpha Group : net income from running of Alpha courses.
- * Hillwalking & Rambling Club : net income from outings attended by members and friends of the charity, currently held by the charity while the club is in abeyance.

* These two funds, whose balances were unchanged for many years, were transferred into the Parish Development Fund in 2018.
