

MINISTER'S MESSAGE - "We'll understand it all by and by'.

Late in the nineteenth century, W.B. Stevens, a preacher in the little crossroads village of Queen City, Missouri was devastated because his young son had died suddenly. He had counselled many people who had lost loved ones. He had given them the right Bible verses, and he had prayed with them and comforted them, but this sorrow struck home. He wondered if he could keep preaching; recently his sermons seemed hollow. How could a loving God allow such a horrible thing to happen? Why do good people suffer, and bad people prosper? Why me, God, why me? Stevens wrote down his thoughts in a poem. He had no easy answers, only the assurance that 'we'll understand it all by and by'. That simple poem expressing a father's heartache later became one of the best-known gospel songs to comfort others with heavy hearts.

I am one with a heavy heart as I write this message, because of the passing on to glory of my father. However, my sorrow is nothing compared to that of Mr Stevens because the loss of a young son must be quite devastating compared to losing a father at a ripe old age. Yet still, the love that we have for those who have been near and dear to us for the most part of our lives and the memories of exiting times bring tears to our eyes and grief to our hearts, whether they die young or die at an old age.

My father - Mr Daniel Che Wachong - rested on the 18th of June 2021 at the age of 79. The news was brought to us while Florence and I were having such a wonderful time away to the town of Oban in celebration of Florence's birthday. We had just visited the Dunollie Museum and were walking along the river, basking in the bright sunshine, when my phone rang. My elder sister had called from Cameroon to announce the sudden death of my father. Florence's birthday celebrations on the 17th had been spoiled by the news of my father's passing the very next day. The sequence of events exemplifies the story of life from birth and life celebrations to death and eternal life for those who love the Lord.

As a minister of the gospel of Jesus Christ, I have had the opportunity to solidarise with people who are mourning, and I have taken many funeral services. I have spoken to people who could not control themselves because the pain of death was overwhelming. I have read biblical texts about death and said prayers to comfort those who mourn. And I have preached edifying sermons to help people overcome their sense of loss. However, some persons, unable to cope with their loss and the place of God in tragic circumstances of death, especially when young people die, have fallen away from the faith. Why me, God, why me? They continue to ask!

The story of Mr Stevens is our story and the story of so many people across the world who are grappling with bereavement and the unanswered questions of death. But when death takes a loved one from us, what is left for us to do is cherish the moments we shared with them in their lifetime. I am happy that I took time to visit with my father severally (recently??) and spent some very wonderful moments with him. I last had a great dinner with him in February of this year in Cameroon and was privileged to know that he was satisfied with how much he had enjoyed from this life and contributed too! But most especially what he was still contributing through the many children he had brought forth and raised. I will remember my father as a good father and a strict disciplinarian whose values and ethics have shaped me into the kind of person I am.

As we mourn our loved ones and continue to seek answers to the questions of life and death, I pray that the chorus of the hymn that was born out of the poem of Mr Stevens following the death of his son, will give us comfort and hope:

`Farther along we'll know all about it Farther along we'll understand why Cheer up my brother, live in the sunshine We'll understand it all by and by'.

Can I ask for your prayers for Florence and me as we leave for Cameroon on Monday the 5th of July to participate in the funeral of my late father. And may God continue comfort all those who mourn. Every Blessing

Worship / Covid Update

Following the conclusion of the recent trial, the Kirk Session agreed to continue the practice of one Service being conducted (in the Church building) and for this to be streamed online via Zoom to those unable to attend in person. This has shown that the principle can be achieved, though in a relatively basic format and consideration will be given after the summer with regard to whether something more elaborate and efficient (and expensive!) is to be investigated and developed.

Due to the sudden death of his father in mid-June, Amos has been granted compassionate leave by the Church of Scotland to allow him to return to Cameroon for his father's funeral and to be with his relatives. During his absence, the Services will be conducted by our Worship Team and pastoral cover will be provided by Rev John Duncan of Leuchars St Athernase (Tel. 01334 870038). Along with the whole country, it certainly looks like we are slowly but surely moving towards the easing of the restrictions placed upon us by the current pandemic.

Following the conducting of rigorous risk assessments, we have enjoyed a whole month of congregational singing – though muffled by the requirement to continue wearing face coverings. Indeed, our choir has recently been allowed to regroup (without face coverings while leading worship – i.e. singing) albeit social distancing requirements mean that only seven of its members can gather together in the Chancel each week and their pre-service practices have been held in the hall as the Choir Room is too small.

While current regulations make it impractical for us to gather in fellowship over tea/coffee in the hall post-Service, a trial was held on Sunday 27th June when a table was set up outside the Kirk House porch and a limited number of people (i.e. Margaret Imlay) served those who stayed behind in glorious sunshine; hopefully, this is a sign of what can be achieved and will be repeated each week.

Also in the pipeline, but a little later, will be the return of pew cushions (although they will need cleaned each week after use), pew bibles and hymn books, printed orders of service, etc. Hopefully, the changes planned by the Government for 19th July will see the social distancing measures reduced to 1 metre indoors and removed altogether outdoors.

As restrictive measures have eased, our weekly attendance has slowly but surely increased, and it is hoped that the changes to come will encourage those who have not felt able to join us in person on a Sunday morning to come along and help us all to worship together in a safe environment.
